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MRS. H. GOULD

SOON TO ACT

The Actress Wife Has Divorce Papers All Ready to File.

New York, May 13.—Mrs. Howard Gould, formerly Katherine Clemmons, the actress, is about to sue her husband for a limited divorce. It was learned on good authority tonight that the papers in the suit have been drawn, and will be filed early this week.

In them Mr. Gould is accused of desertion, nonsupport and cruelty, according to friends of Mrs. Gould who have seen the papers. According to this same informant, a summons will be served on Mr. Gould in a few days.

The action is not a surprise to the friends of the former actress and present mistress of the Gould mansion at Port Washington, L. I. Ten months ago there came an estrangement between Mrs. Gould and her husband. They have seen each other only a few times since and on those occasions the interviews are said to have been brief.

Calls Howard Poor Provider.

Mrs. Gould, through one of her friends, said last night that her husband had not contributed to her support since last September. They parted in July last year.

According to Mrs. Gould's friend the idea of trying to seek a limited divorce from Mr. Gould has been the result of long deliberation in which many efforts have been made to induce him to set a certain income aside for the use of his wife in his lifetime.

This request, according to Mrs. Gould's friend, always was refused.

Mrs. Gould has been in frequent consultations with her attorney, Clarence J. Shearn, regarding the best course for her to pursue since the separation.

The final determination to bring matters to a head came three weeks ago, when William Hawley threatened to sue Howard Gould for \$250,000 which Hawley alleged was due him in payment for the work of having Mrs. Gould shadowed by detectives and in other ways trying to get together material on which Mr. Gould could sue for divorce. Hawley asserted that Mr. Gould had employed him for that purpose and that he had offered certain other evidence to Mr. Gould.

Says Detectives Hounded Her.

"This was the last straw," said Mrs. Gould's friend yesterday. "For many months Mrs. Gould had been followed by detectives in the employ of Hawley. Sometimes the detectives posed as coachmen, sometimes as footmen and other servants."

Always she was under the watchful eyes of the hirelings of Hawley. The idea was to get material upon which Mr. Gould could take action to free himself from his wife, but the effort failed."

COBALT NEWS

At the Trethewey 50 men are at work and stoping is being done on their main veins. During the first three months of this year this mine has shipped 25,738 tons of ore.

English capitalists have bought a copper claim of 40 acres in the Nipissing district adjoining the copper properties now owned by the Nipissing Copper and Silver Company. The price is about \$5,000.

The contract has been let for installing an electric power plant at Cobalt, to cost half a million dollars. The plant will supply the power to operate the mines of the district and work will begin at once.

A prospector recently brought from Lake Umbagog a handful of ore which he could not define. Some Toronto men bought these for \$15, and on examining and assaying the samples they were found to contain platinum. A close corporation has been organized to develop the property.

There are 40 men at work on the Nancy Helen property, and the foundations are laid for the power house just south of the shaft house. 30x66 feet. It was originally intended to locate this power house on the lake shore, but they have decided to build it at the works, and pump the water up from the lake instead. The Nancy Helen and the Cleveland-Cobalt intend to put in a joint pump, and both properties will be supplied from the same pump.

It is understood that one of the large Cobalt companies is attempting to make arrangements with one of the concentrator companies lately organized to handle all the low-grade ore mined on that property so far. There are now several properties in the camp which have as much as \$200,000 worth of low-grade ore lying on their separate dumps. The statement was made last week that a couple of concentrators might be built in Cobalt this year.

A BOY AND A GUN.

Last month a fox killed twelve hens belonging to Farmer Davis, near Racine, Wisconsin, and as it was to be expected that Reynard would return for the rest of the flock, the farmer's son, a lad of thirteen years old, named Abe, got permission to fix up a spring gun to give the intruder a warm reception. He loaded a shot-gun and tied a string to the trigger and the other end of it to a dead hen. If the fox picked up the hen the gun would go off and pepper him.

The gun was heard to go off about midnight, but the farmer did not go out until daylight. Then a man who had been shot in the leg was found in the hen-house. He owned up that he had come to steal a horse from the barn, but in the darkness had blundered in among the chickens and got further and further away from home for more sticks. And in this huge pile of sticks he stores his winter supply of nuts. Many times, when we were enjoying farm life by living mostly on sorghum and cornbread, buttermilk and Missouri dried apples, have we gone to the woods with the other boys and taken neatly-hulled walnuts from the nests of a wood rat.

Elephant Dies of Remorse

The Jardin des Plantes, the poor man's zoo in Paris—one has to pay about 12 or 25 cents to enter the other zoo, the Jardin d'Acclimation, in the Bois de Boulogne—has lost its elephant Said. His death may make zoologists reconsider their views on the difference between animals and mankind, for Said seems to have had more than a vague notion of what was right and wrong. Said never was anything but kind-hearted and willing until he was taken with fever a few years ago. Then neither his temper nor his limbs knew any bounds, and after much rampaging he killed his faithful keeper Neef, who brought him over from London in 1883. The children soon forgave Said, but he could not forgive himself. He became morose and melancholy, and wasted away. The last few months he had been but skin and bones. Two generations of Parisians who have ridden on his back will mourn the loss of him.—London Standard.

THE RAGE FOR RISK.

With the increase of such popular amusements as are afforded by "loop-the-loop" contrivances, evolutions on parachutes, animal show exhibitions, and yet newer and more ingenious arrangements for catering to the "race for risk," comes the demand from another section of the public, where more temperate and sane ideas prevail, that something shall be done by legislation, if necessary, to limit the exhibitions of human daring within the bounds of something like a decent regard for safety. Possibly, if the only persons who engaged in these performances and risked their limbs and lives, either for the mere "fun of the thing," or for business purposes, were adults or men or women of the professional class, no protective measures would be necessary; but since innocent children of tender age and silly youth of both sexes are beguiled into these same dangerous sports, it seems imperative that the law shall step in and draw the line beyond which these schemes for imperiling human life shall not go. There still exists, we are sorry to believe, a considerable fraction of the people, even in this enlightened land, who are but little above the level of the Romans of ancient days in their taste for vulgar and brutal shows.—Leit's Weekly.
