Ans.—Just to prove that the unexpected sometimes happens, the scouring formula (which I hope is the one you wish is right at hand, and reprinted with pleasure.
A cheap and excellent scouring material for cutlery and graniteware can be made of equal weights of bath brick and hard soap. Scrape, soap and wash, bath brick, and slice one pound of Sunlight or other good soap. Dissolve soap on stove, without water, and slowly add the scraped bath brick to soap; mold into cakes and put away to dry for a few days. This is just as good as the "boughten" kind, and much cheaper. A finer scouring material may be made by using washing instead of bath brick.
Gooseberry Fool—Top and tail a pound of green gooseberries, boil with three-quarters of a pound of sugar and a cupful of water. When quite soft press

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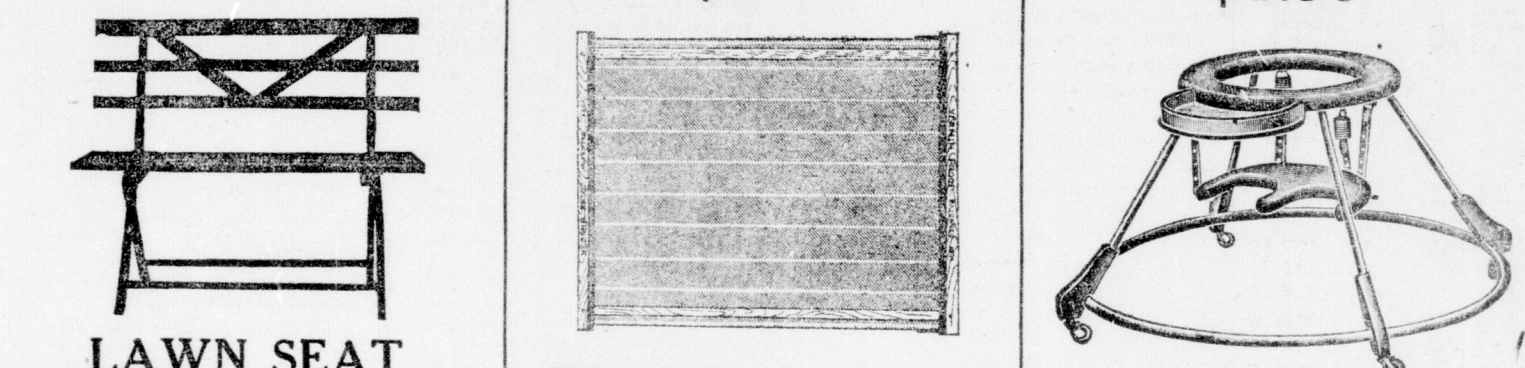

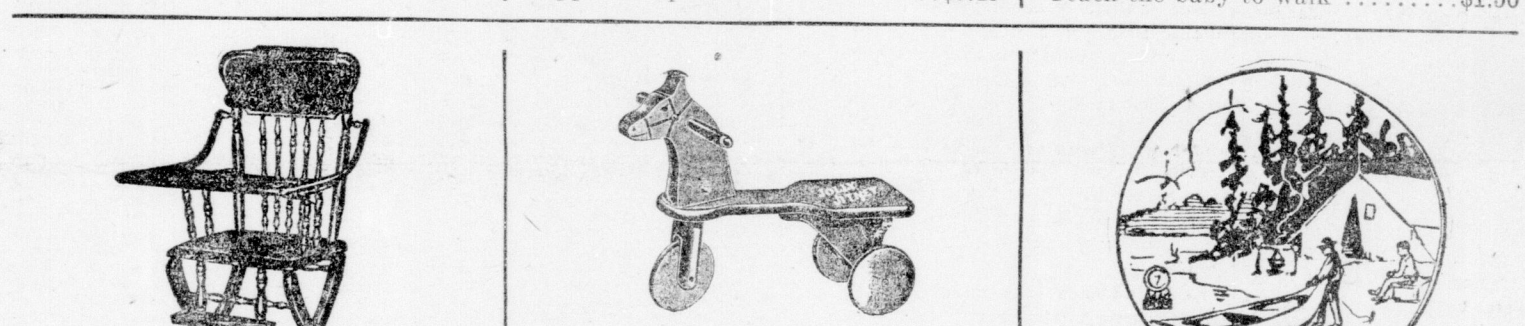
