CANADIAN LAW IS CALLED UNFAIR TO DRUNKARD'S WIFE

Forces Her To Pay Fine, Says
Tennyson Smith.

E. Tennyson Smith, imperator and anti-liquor orator, again addressed a capacity house at the Salvation Army Citadel last night in his local temperance campaign.

Rev. H. H. Bingham delivered a short introductory address as chairman of the meeting. He said that it was particularly gratifying for him to introduce Mr. Smith, not only because of his great work as a temperance exponent but because he came from a country so fondly associated with the Canadian boys at the front. Mr. Bingham recalled the time when Canadians were accustomed to speak rather contemptuously of England and Americans, but that was a time of misunderstanding and misconception of the character of the Britisher, by Canadians, Canada and Britain have become permanently united with the blood of both their sons on a foreign battlefield, he said.

Mr. Smith took his subject, the story of the rescue of John Gough, an evangelist, who for 35 years taught the evil of the liquor traffic after being converted into a temperance reformer, a process which took many months and cost him dearly.

The speaker also denounced the method of dealing with drunkards in Canada. He said that he witnessed four different drunkards enter the local courtroom and inside of fifteen minutes all four cases were disposed of with the usual \$10 and costs fine. The fine is invariably paid by the wife and children of the drunkard, who realize that it is better to pay the fine than lose their man's earning capacity for fourteen days.

The Canadian law makes the wife and children of the drunkard suffer rather than the man himself, he said. Many drunkards are only too glad to escape with a small fine if they do not have to pay for the sentence of their husband for drunkenness. It is a serious thing for the poor wife, rather than lose his money to buy food and drink for her children, she pays the fine. In this way the wife is made to suffer for the husband's crime.

Impersonating the late John Gough, Mr. Smith gave the audience an imitation of the addresses the converted drunkard delivered before he was before the houses of the States and Great Britain of his own battle with the temptation of drink.

Mr. Smith gave an appreciated exhibition of his military drill when he portrayed a court house scene as witnessed by himself in England. He aroused laughter with impersonations of people connected with liquor prohibition and promotion.

A meeting will be held tonight, when Mr. Smith will give a realistic representation of a "use-of-force" between the temperance party and the liquor traffic.

May Increase Fines
To Stop Infractions
Of Traffic Bylaws

Magistrate Intends To Hit
Speeders and Sidewalk
Users In Pocket.

Fines imposed in the police court appear to have little effect in reducing the number of motorists and bicyclists who continue daily to appear in court, no less than eighteen names, each charged with an infraction of the by-law being entered on the blotter today.

In every instance the person summoned had avowed an appearance in court by pleading guilty and paying his fine.

Eight of the number summoned were drivers or owners of motor cars who had travelled over the city payments at speeds varying from 28 to 47 miles an hour.

Of the ten bicyclists seven were school boys and the remaining three workmen, each having selected the sidewalk for a spin instead of staying on the roadway.

The motorists paid \$5 and costs each, and the bicyclists \$3 and costs each.

Magistrate Graydon is contemplating a substantial raise in the fines in order to reduce the number of violations of the bylaws.

CALL FOR MEN TO AID ON FARMS URGENT AS EVER

Roots Harvest and Fall Plowing Cause It.

READY TO GIVE SUITS
Farmers Who Want Hands
Ready to Meet All Re-
quirements.

Urgent appeals for farm hands from farmers all over the district are coming in at the local Ontario employment bureau office, Immigration Inspector Farrel has had his hands full in dealing satisfactorily with the applicants for help, and reports that the need for extra men at harvest, the root crops before cold weather sets in is particularly urgent. The acreage of many varieties of produce next year will depend to a large extent upon how help can be secured to present moment for plowing purposes.

In preparation for the enforcement of the military service act, a proportion of district farmers have looked as far ahead as the spring to obtain help. With the first draft a great number of young farmers from this vicinity will be taken, it is expected, and as a preparatory move farm-owners are now taking boys from 17 to 18 on their farms during the winter to insure themselves an adequate number of men for spring planting and plowing.

An appeal for labor was made Thursday by one farmer, who wanted three men immediately. Coincidentally three young men happened to be in the employment office at the time of the call for aid, and Mr. Farrel casually mentioned that they would suit the bill first rate. The men said that they would not mind going to the help of the farmer, but it would take some time to go home and change their good clothes. Mr. Farrel then wired the farmer and secured assurance from him that the prospective farm hands would be supplied with new suits as soon as they arrived at the farm. This condition was agreeable to all parties, and the young men were donated with new suits of clothes upon their arrival at the farm house.

Should an Indian summer of about one week's duration set in, practically all the potatoes and beans could be lifted and stored, and a fair amount of extra plowing done. The majority of district men working on the farms have evidenced their willingness to continue work until called into training for overseas service.

BURWASH WORSE THAN HELL, SAYS ANEX-PRISONER

Prison Farm Near Painted
Black Enough, Declares
Soldier

LOST 32 POUNDS THERE
One of 50 Men Sent From
Here to Censured Institution
Speaks of Conditions.

That conditions at the Ontario Prison Farm at Burwash are no more shocking than hell, and that the alleged army of prisoners there are not in the least excited, was the statement made to an Advertiser reporter by a London soldier who had served six months there for desertion and had returned to the city.

"Any things really bad as claimed at the Burwash farm," was asked the former prisoner.

"They are worse, far worse than they have ever been painted," he replied. "I am 32 pounds lighter than when I went away, and take it from me I would rather be sentenced to hell out-right than spend another six months there."

The soldier then related some of the grievances of which prisoners there complained.

1. That some of them were compelled to physical work when they were not fit to do it. One instance was given of where a prisoner was forced to work, although instructed by the camp physician not to do so.

2. That the boots supplied were not suitable to wet weather.

3. That in bad weather the men occasionally receive a wetting when a long distance from the camp, and that on returning to camp there was no place to dry their clothes.

4. That the laundry work on the underclothing is not satisfactory, and that socks are served out which are not in proper repair.

5. That the outer garments sometimes lack buttons.

6. That at Camp 1 two men out of 140 had diseases and were not segregated. Also at Camp 3 one or more of the 142 prisoners were similarly situated.

7. That blankets were not aired.

8. That owing to imperfect cleansing of the latrine, the men were obliged to work ten hours a day, while those at Guelph had only to work eight. There were no Saturday afternoon off and no hours for recreation.

9. That the profanity was used in addressing the prisoners. One prisoner in referring to one of the prisoners who while escaping had been shot, stated that the former had said to the prisoner that it was lucky that he had not been shot too, indicating too, indirectly on the part of the foreman.

10. That the bathing arrangements were so poor that it was necessary to wait fifteen minutes before securing a bath.

11. London Prisoner Died.

During the year over fifty prisoners were sent from this city to the farm at Burwash.

A soldier named Keegan, sentenced here three months ago, died recently at the institution hospital, but under what circumstances was not known.

CANAGIANS' CAMPS IN BRITAIN MORAL, SAYS T. J. SHIELDS

Cases of Drunkenness Few,
Declares Ex-City Pastor.

GIVES WAR LECTURE HERE
Says Public Opinion in England
Would Not Warrant
Prohibition.

Cases of drunkenness are few in the Canadian camps across England, according to Rev. T. J. Shields, a former pastor of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church, who spoke there Thursday evening on "England in War Time."

"Nothing is permitted in the camp areas which would have a tendency to corrupt the morals of the men," said the speaker, "and I am not posting now of the great cities, or of the conduct of the men on leave. In the great cities there are great temptations, and I suppose there will be until the millennium. Certain things might be tolerated in the cities, but the military authorities are doing everything possible to keep the men clean."

Sixty per cent of the people one sees in hotels and restaurants take into consideration the fact that they are in the army, and scores of gentlemen wearing the livens of the church are to be seen drinking their ale or beer, though not often spirits. From his observations, he did not believe that there was sufficient public opinion in England to warrant the establishment of prohibition there.

The leisurely preparation of United States for the war is a very possible because Britain ruled the waves, an officer of the United States army has told him about this, adding that it had not been for the protection of Britain, the United States would have been forced to go into the war long ago.

QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They
Will Be Answered From Official
Information by The Advertiser

Question—Would an American citizen who has been examined and placed in Category 2-B have to leave Canada when the agreement between Great Britain and the United States comes into effect, or would he be permitted to stay until his category is called?

Answer—If such an agreement comes into effect, he would likely be asked to report to an American consul in Canada, and unless his services were required by the United States, he would likely be allowed to remain here. It is not known what use is being made by the United States army of men fit only for non-combatant service, but they might be required there in some capacity.

Question—One of the 63rd Battery open for such men?

Answer—Yes, if he were not a member of class one, that is if he were not between the ages of twenty and thirty-four. If he is between the ages of twenty and thirty-four he is already a soldier and on leave, and if he goes into uniform he is not permitted to leave his duty after a leave of absence. The authorities are not favorable to the use of "conscripts" and the men in class one are called "drafted men." Those who after filling out the report for service form at the postoffice, report for duty before they are called upon, have the privilege of choosing the unit to which they join. None will be called upon to report earlier than December 10, 1917. At present, though it may be shortly, you could likely get into the 64th Battery at Guelph.
