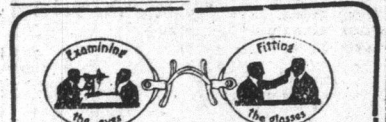

LETTER-CARRIERS IN CITY NOW DISTRUST SETTLEMENT TERMS

Beginning to Doubt Wisdom of Agreeing.

BENEFITS SEEM SMALL

Younger Ones Gain, But Older Ones Are Not Satisfied.

Letter-carriers of this city are beginning to think that perhaps their Western brethren are doing the wise thing in remaining on strike. So far the details of the strike to hand show that the carriers gained very little, they say, and they are now at the mercy of a sub-committee of the cabinet.

In the first place, some of the carriers have been deluded as to what the \$150 voted by the last session of parliament, but never paid, really was. There are many of them who were of the opinion that it was a statutory increase. Instead it was nothing more than a bonus, and an addition to the \$100 bonus already voted. The settlement of the strike has made but one change; it has brought the temporary carriers under the provisions of the \$150 bonus. In other words, the young carriers are the only ones to derive much benefit. The other carriers would have received a double benefit had the bonus been made a statutory increase, as it would have increased their pensions. As a bonus it does not affect pensions at all.

In reply to that question, the ministers at Ottawa was that they could not give a statutory increase in wages without an act of parliament. In light of recent events, the carriers do not expect this. The local carriers are today seriously reviewing the situation of the past few days. The outlook, they say, is not rosy.

VICTORIA HOSPITAL WILL GET BED FROM H. D. S. ASSOCIATION

Discharged Men Will Also Form Band.

A meeting of the Honorably Discharged Soldiers' Association was held in the club rooms of the association Friday evening. A special report of the band committee was read, which stated that this committee had decided to form a band of the comrades, to consist of thirty members, and that they should hold rehearsals twice a week lasting for two hours. The club would be expected to furnish the instruments. It was decided to call a meeting so that every member may be present and express his views on the matter.

The committee presented good reports, there being no members of the club out of work and none sick. One member was provided with a position this morning at the Byron Sanatorium and will start on Saturday.

The badges for the men have been mailed and they will arrive in this city about Tuesday, when they will be distributed to the members. It was decided that the general meetings be postponed until September 6 on account of the warm weather and the inability of the members to attend. In the meantime, it is decided to hold a special meeting, notice will be given to that effect through the press.

G. T. R. CONDUCTOR DROPS DEAD WHILE AT WORK IN YARDS

Norman McDonald of Sarnia Long in Service.

Norman McDonald of Sarnia, a conductor on the G. T. R., dropped dead in the east yards this morning at 6 o'clock of heart failure. Mr. McDonald, who was about 65 years of age, was performing his regular duties in connection with the westbound freight when his death occurred. The remains were removed to the morgue and will be taken to Sarnia today. He was a widower, but is survived by three children.

Mr. McDonald was one of the oldest conductors on the road of Sarnia, and has been with the G. T. R. for over 40 years. One of the local conductors will accompany the remains to Sarnia.

CHLOROPFORM NEEDED TO REMOVE PEA

RUSH COAL OFFICES WHEN NATURAL GAS IS NOT AVAILABLE

Railway Board Restrictions Cause Citizens to Scurry to Coalmen.

WON'T GUARANTEE PRICE.

Coal dealers taking orders now will not guarantee any price at time of delivery owing to the greatly fluctuating market, although at present hard coal is selling at \$10.35 per ton. Soft coal, of which there is an abundance, is selling at \$8.25 per ton, and is available in four-foot lengths, can be secured at from \$11.50 to \$12 per cord. If cut up into stove sizes it costs considerably more, and this is doubtless the reason that Sarnians do not care for wood, the cost being a great deal more than for coal.

The gas restrictions are causing the great demand for hard coal. The Sarnia Gas Company has just received a communication from the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board setting forth when, how and by whom gas may be used this winter. Natural gas may be used in appliances for heating water which are in ordinary use in places supplied by artificial gas, such as, for instance, the Gowin heater, of which there are great numbers in the city.

Rules for Use supplied without reference to the board to houses under construction for which appliances for the use of natural gas had been installed before July 1, 1918. All barbers are to be supplied with natural gas for special appliances for shaving. Landscapers are to be supplied with gas for lawnmowers. Dentists and all doctors are to be supplied with gas for laboratory uses. Plumbers and plumbers can use gas for heating soldering irons and melting habit metal. An application has been made to permit tailors to use gas for pressing irons.
