THREE TURKEYS AMONG 60,000 BEST MARKET COULD FOR CITY TODAY; MORE CHICKENS AND DUCKS

Turkey for Thanksgiving? Yes, if three may be divided among 60,000 people, for that was the exact number which appeared on the market this morning. One of these sold for 40 cents a pound, another for 50, and the others for 60 cents a pound—in fact, their price seemed to depend altogether on the conscience of the seller. The poultry market, however, featured ducks, any quantity of which were displayed at fairly reasonable prices. Chickens, too, were plentiful, and sold from 15 to 25 cents a pound live weight. This morning, however, expanded to from 30 to 35 cents retail.

Fruit Scarce.
The fruit market has now dwindled down to almost entirely, although there are still a few grapes being imported. No grapes were shown by local growers, and this is probably the last week in which this fruit will be on the market. Tomatoes, on the other hand, are plentiful, and are being sold at 15 and 22 a dozen are getting buyers.

Apples Cheaper.
The apple is the important fruit on the market now, and Fruit Inspector Connor says their price is away down.

Turning Down Business

A Series of Articles on "The Advantage of Morning Shopping," by
P. W. READ
Advertising Manager of the Thomas Furniture Company.

Ladies of London were particularly fortunate in having last night's advertising. The advertiser, however, was above par and told the several stores a great thing, this, that he was advertising.

"Reading the ads" is a favorite pastime with thousands of London ladies, and I never see a dry goods ad or other advertisement without picturing the pleasure afforded even by the mere reading of the ads.

Generally speaking, advertisements are more concise and straight to the point than ordinary news items—perhaps this is the reason for the interest they are easy to read. No, it can't be that altogether; a good advertisement should induce action, should make you want to buy. Perhaps, then, it's the persuasive influence of the writer that holds attention.

Carr W. Lipper, advertising manager of Crowley-Milner, Detroit, said in a letter last week in reply to mine asking the success of morning shopping in that city: "We have had so many sales that we have formed the habit of a certain degree."

That means that Crowley-Milner have gone to some lengths to stimulate morning sales by offering special values. The Stanley Mills store in Hamilton got into a short while ago at the same place when \$19 sets of dishes came out at 19c, together with a refrigerator at the same price.

I heard a shoe man in Hamilton say that he had no idea so many read his ad, until one day there was an error on the wrong side of \$4.

Speaking of errors, I carefully saw advertisements checked, one of mine in Hamilton endeavored to sell \$95 combination ranges at \$65. Not many read that ad, and it cost the Green Furnishing Company only \$30 to have up that length to stimulate morning sales.

But I'll never forget the trouble I got into a short while ago at the same place when \$19 sets of dishes came out at 19c, together with a refrigerator at the same price.

Really it was so ridiculous that any fair-minded person could straightway understand that an error had in some way occurred. Most people accepted it as a large sized joke, and there was just like "pouring water on a duck's back," as far as sales are concerned, only one who inferred that we were making a stab at dishonest advertising.
