Settlers of any other nationality are welcomed to Canada if they conform to immigration

The bread served in this room was hard and dried out, while the butter was so strong in taste and smell that few of the attendants ever used it. It was not as good as oleomargarine or lard.

Poor Quality of Milk.

At the time that F. Spearin was in charge of the dairy the milk was fair in the morning, but by evening was thin and blue, and almost unfit for use On two occasions the odor of it was so bad that it had to be thrown away.
