Rome, March 4.—The Giornale d'Italia, commenting today on the exchange of communications between President Wilson and the allied premiers with regard to the Adriatic controversy, says the discussion is "producing a painful impression on the Italians, owing to the sour opposition of the American president to Italy's aspirations, which are founded both on right and on sentiment." and on sentiment."
"He does not take into account," the

newspaper continues, "the help given by Italy to the cause of human freedom. He depicts Italy as desirous for dominion and greedy for territory insisting on the fable of Italian imperialism, while the Jugo-Slavs have annexed Bulgarians, Rumanians, Magyars, Austrians, Italians, Albanians and Montenegrins more numerous that the 400,000 Slavs whom we would annex to obtain a softentiar. to obtain a safe frontier. "President Wilson depicts the Jugo "President Wilson depicts the Jugo-Slavs as the victims and the Italians as the oppressors. This artificial manoguvre proves the injustice of his attitude, the animosity of which naturally is not realized by the Americans. How can President Wilson speak of Italian imperialism when he allowed Czecho-Slovakia to annex 3,000,000 Germans?"

PREMIER NITTI SEES DANGER OF EUROPE LOSING POSITION

London, March 4 .- Europe is in dan ger of permanently losing the position she held in the world before the out-break of the world war, says Premier Nitti of Italy, th an interview printed by the Manchester Guardian today. He points out that Europe is no longer a creditor, but is on the debit side of the edger.

SENATOR MOVES FOR EXPULSION OF TURKS

WASHINGTON. March 3 .- Under resolution introduced today by Senator King (Democrat, Utah), the Senate would declare in favor of the expulsion of the "Government of the Ottoman Turks" from Constantinople, and the erection of three independent states in the old Turkish Empire under the direction of the allied powers or the League of Nations."


