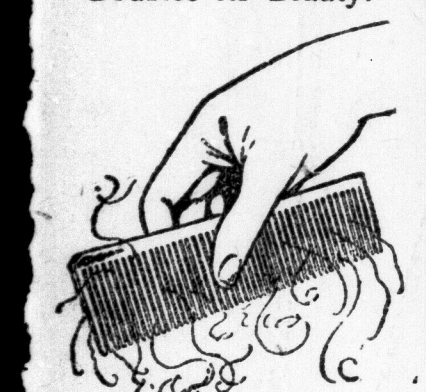

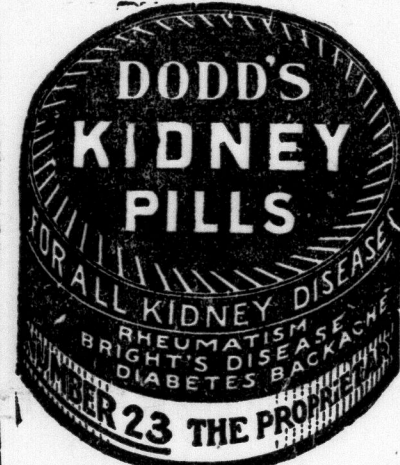
BRANTFORD PRODUCES CHEAPEST BREAD IN NATION, SAYS BOARD

Cost To Canadian Bakers Rose
One-Fifth of One Cent
a Loaf.

OTTAWA, May 17.—Average cost to
Canadian bakers of production of
bread during the month of March in-
creased one-fifth of one cent on a
pound and a half loaf, due to an in-
crease in the cost of flour of 24 cents
per barrel. In publishing its monthly
statement on the production and cost
of bread, the board of commerce states
that this item of flour is the only one
in which returns show any particular
increase during the month.
The board of commerce report states
that representative firms in Montreal,
Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver are
furnishing the board with satisfactory
and reliable reports of their operations.
"Certain firms having discontinued re-
porting," concludes the statement,
"they will be prosecuted."

ENGLAND MOVES TO CONTROL OIL SUPPLY

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Great
Britain's policy with reference to world
petroleum supplies is reported to be
to exclude aliens from control of petro-
leum supplies within the Empire and
to endeavor to obtain some measure of
control over oil properties in foreign
countries. The Senate was informed to-
day in a state department report trans-
mitted by President Wilson.



UNION GOVT. TO TRY TO SURVIVE, SAYS LOUGHEED

After Fatal Delay, Unionists
To Have Brand New
Platform.

WILL BUILD MACHINE

Albertan Senator Hopes To
Use Same Organization
As in 1917.

CALGARY, May 17.—"The Union
Government has a platform, and now
that the prime minister, Sir Robert
Borden has returned to Ottawa, that
platform will be announced at an early
date," declared Sir James Lougheed,
federal senator from Alberta, to the
Canadian Press Monday morning. Sir
James made the foregoing statement in
reply to a question as to what were
the prospects of the Union Government
continuing its career as a party.
Sir James further said that the an-
nouncement of the platform "will be
followed, it is hoped, by an effective
political organization."
When asked what would be the at-
titude of this Unionist campaign or-
ganization towards present political
organizations, Sir James replied that
the organization was a fusion of the Conservative
organization with the Liberal-Unionists
who at that time joined it, and the
large percentage of whom are its sup-
porters now.

INTERSTATE BODY IN EFFORT TO RELIEVE FREIGHT BLOCKADE

Cars of Food and Perishables
To Have Full Preference.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Members
of the interstate commerce commission
today met with representatives of the
railroads to discuss means of breaking
the freight blockade. Primary con-
sideration will be given to the rail-
roads' appeal for help, filed with the
commission on Saturday.
The railroads suggested several de-
tails to the commission for inclusion
in its traffic plan to break the con-
gestion. One of these was a general
scheme for the movement of grain
cars westward and coal cars eastward
to meet current requirements. Cars
for food and perishables, however,
would have full preference over all
others under the railroadmen's plan.

WATERWAYS HEARING IN NORTH DAKOTA

GRAND FORKS, N.D., May 17.—The
international joint waterways commis-
sion, which is holding hearings in Can-
ada and the United States on the
question of providing a deep water-
way from the Great Lakes to the
Atlantic Ocean, will be in Grand Forks
tomorrow to hear interested persons
from North Dakota and northwestern
Minnesota.
Among the North Dakotans heard
will be Governor Lynn J. Fraser.

OUTLOOK BLACK ON HYDROCANAL; WORK SLACKENS

Reports From Chippewa Pes-
simistic, Many Quit, Opera-
tions Disorganized.

SOME ARE LAID OFF

Reports That Commission Will
Stop Work Make Situa-
tion Bad.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., May 17.—
Reports coming from the hydro works
tonight are very pessimistic. Appar-
ently many laborers have quit, and the
work is disorganized.
Many men have been laid off by the
commission. It is stated, the commis-
sioners, mechanics, steam shovel
men and all the repair gang. It was
said that about 150 have been laid off.
There has been a large number of
foreign laborers in this city today, and
they have been drawing money out of
the banks. Federation officials are
discouraged, and fear that an attempt
is being made to discredit the labor
organization.
Unconfirmed reports that the commis-
sion will stop the construction work
the middle of this week are also a cause
of much unrest. Local people frankly
admit that the situation is bad.

BRIGHT FUTURE FOR HYDRO, SAYS REPORT OF BECK

Chairman of Commission Is
Likely To Submit Power
Report To Legislature
Today.

TORONTO, May 17.—Sir Adam Beck,
chairman of the Ontario Hydro-
Electric Power Commission, in his an-
nual report on hydro, which will prob-
ably be submitted to the legislature
tomorrow, is very optimistic as to
the future of the hydro movement in On-
tario. He tells an interesting story of
the hydro commission's recovery from
the slump following the signing of
the armistice, when the munitions
plants suddenly closed down, as well
as factories making war supplies, en-
tailing a serious reduction in the
loads on many of the hydro systems.
The decrease in revenue which im-
paired the financial operations of the
municipalities on the hydro sys-
tems, caused a considerable slump in
the hydro's business, but the following
August the hydro began to recover, and
by the end of 1919 practically all of its
available power was being used.

Prior to the signing of the armistice,
the report states, there were over 4-
000 plants engaged on munitions and
war supplies, these using seventy per
cent of the total power available by
the hydro. When the slump came most
of these establishments were idle, and
in some of the municipalities there
was a decline of twenty-five per cent
in the amount of power required.
During the period of readjustment
the hydro had been very successful,
according to the report, notwithstanding
that much of the material had to be
purchased in the United States, and
the commission had to pay \$25,000 in
duties and war taxes.

The continued success of the hydro
enterprise is confidently predicted by
Sir Adam Beck. "The revenue of the
commission, in the main," Sir Adam
states, "has been sufficient to meet all
the operating expense and necessary
fixed charges, practically the only
exceptions being those municipalities
in which large blocks of power were
supplied for their manufacture of mu-
nitions, and which, after the cessation
of hostilities were not replaced by com-
mercial loads until late in the year. In
these municipalities the building up of
loads during the coming year will
place them on a paying basis and
where such is not the case a read-
justment of rates may be necessary."

TWO FINED \$1,000 FOR ILLEGAL LIQUOR SALES

One Man Admits Having Sold
300 Cases Per Month
Since March.

WINDSOR, May 17.—Fines of \$1,000
and costs each were levied in police
court today against Herbert Drouillard
and Oscar D. Drouillard, both of Louis-
ville, who pleaded guilty to the illegal
sale of liquor. The latter admitted
that since March he had sold an aver-
age of 300 cases a month. They were
arrested today by officers of the pro-
vincial license board operating in this
district, on information sworn out by
Inspector Moushinski.

GETS THREE YEARS FOR ROBBING MAILS

Burton Edwards of Watford
Also Admitted Charges
of Forgery.

SARNIA, May 17.—Burton Edwards of
Watford was today sentenced to three
years in Kingston Penitentiary by
Judge Taylor, when found guilty of
theft from his master's mail, and
two charges of forgery. He was given
a year on each count.
Edwards' arrest in Petrolia followed
his cashing of Dominion Express money
orders stolen from the mail on a route
on which he was rural mail driver. The
orders were reported missing. Taken
into custody Edwards admitted he had
stolen and cashed them after forging
names on both orders.

DRURY OPPOSED TO SHORTER HOURS' MOVE

TORONTO, May 17.—At a banquet
given by the Independent Labor party
of this city and the Toronto District
Trades and Labor Council in the Prince
George Hotel tonight, Premier E. C.
Drury was a guest and spoke against
the movement tending toward shorter
hours. John W. Buckley of the In-
dependent Labor party, expressed a
strong conviction that the eight-hour
day should be made operative through-
out the Dominion.

FORMER RESIDENT OF PARKHILL IS DEAD

WINNIPEG, May 16.—Elizabeth Mc-
Innis, pioneer of Manitoba, widow of
James Hutson, died Sunday morning at
the family residence here after two
week's illness. In her 76th year. She,
with her late husband, came west in
1877 from Parkhill, Ontario, and
settled in the Boyne River district, now
known as Carleton, where they resided
until the death of Mr. Hutson twenty
years ago. Since then she has been a
lifelong member of the Presbyterian
Church. She leaves two sisters, Mrs.
P. E. Stevens and Mrs. J. A. Carry of
this city, and one son, A. Hutson, of
Prosser, Alberta. Interment will be
made in Winnipeg.

KING ASKS NITTI TO FORM NEW CABINET

ROME, May 17.—Signor Nitti, whose
cabinet resigned last week, has ac-
cepted an invitation by King Victor
Emmanuel to form a new ministry.
The invitation was extended today af-
ter the king had conferred with
former Premier Tittori and Orlando.
