Claims That Jockey Clubs Are Business Propositions and Breeding Will Not Be Allowed to Suffer.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—(Special.)—The meeting of the Miller anti-gambling committee, appointed for to-day, was adjourned for a week at the re quest of counsel for the jockey clubs and horsemen, who are awaiting receipts of copies of all the evidence in order to conclude their written argu-

Argument on behalf of the support defence," hey says, in beginning, re-ferring to the hand bookmen, tipsters, cuts, and newspaper advertisements, the case against all these goes by default."

He quotes Sir Fitzjames Stephens' statement that the business of gambling is in defiance of the general body the law of England, and adds.
