GRAVESEND, June 2.—Naushon, the 7 to 5 favorite, easily won the Expectation Stakes, five furlongs, for 2-year-olds, at Gravesend to-day, defeating a fairly good field. Babbler led by five lengths into the stretch, but here began to stop and Naushon, coming fast, took the lead and won by three lengths. Little Fred Langan, a jockey, met an untimely end in the sixth race, when his mount fell in the home stretch and rolled over on him. The boy died instantly. The race was for 2-year-olds and thirteen horses were sent away by the starter. Coming into the stretch closely bunched, Warwick, with Butwell up, stumbled and fell, and Muff fell over Warwick. Immediately following was Langan on Stalwart Lad, and in a trice his mount had stumbled, and the hoy was catapulted over his head. Then Stalwart Lad toppied over on Langan, killing him instantly. The field ran well bunched on the turn, and when the big crowd saw Warwick fall, a cry of dismay went up, that was intimediately followed by another when Muff and Stalwart Lad tumbled over him Davis, who rode Muff, jumped up at once, but Butwell lay until he was picked up and Langan never moved.

Magistrate Houston of Chatham Has Novel Ideas on Enforcement of Moral Reform,

CHATHAM, June 2.—(Special.)—Fully 300 delegates attended the convention of the Western Association of Baptist Churches in this city to-day. A. McNee of Windsor gave an instructive talk on western missions, followed by a convention of moral and social reform, conducted by Rev. Dr. Hughson of Windsor. He pointed out that the church is not doing her part in this movement, and he advocated the institution of local option campaigns under the direct charge of the church.

Magistrate Houston of this city pre sented a resolution that the politics should be outside of church work, but moral and social reform should be a direct part of the duties of the church, and that the government be petitioned to extend the laws of the country to make an indictable offence of gambling make an indictable offence of gambling on all modes of conveyances, including vessels and trains, and that the association take seriously into consideration the fact that they are largely responsible for the character of the representatives in parliament. He also advocated the engaging of detertives
