GEN. WOOD SCORES DOUGHTY CHARGED WITH COMPLICITY IN PLOT TO KIDNAP A. J. SMALL

WANT DOUGHTY ON CHARGE OF SEEKING TO KIDNAP SMALL

Trustees of Ambrose Small Estate Dissatisfied With Result of Search on Existing Warrant—To Offer Five Thousand Dollar Inducement for Secretary's Apprehension.

If actions can be put into words, the trustees of the Ambrose Small estate are apparently dissatisfied with the efforts, or non-efforts, of the local police authorities to discover the whereabouts of John Doughty, the secretary to the missing theatrical man. In a few days' time, the trustees will offer a reward of something like \$5,000 for information that will lead to the apprehension of John Doughty. The circular announcing this fact will be drawn up by the solicitors to the Small estate, and will contain a photograph of the wanted man. In effect, the reward bill will be similar to the one offering the \$50,000 for knowledge of Mr. Small's whereabouts, but it will differ in one material particular—a definite charge of conspiracy to kidnap will be inserted in it. The police hold a warrant for Doughty's arrest on this charge, and the issuance of the reward bill is based on the wording of the warrant.

It is understood the trustees of the estate are at a loss to understand why the search for Doughty has not been more energetically followed, especially as the warrant has been in existence for some time past.

The trustees to the estate taking the view that the key to Mr. Small's whereabouts or fate is thru John Doughty, view by the way The World all thru the mystery has advocated—have taken the matter into their own hands and will try to clear the air so far as the Doughty end of the affair is concerned, by offering of the above named reward, and public making a definite charge against the missing secretary, who, it may be stated, has been missing since December 24th last.

Official Statement.
Yesterday afternoon the trustees to the estate handed out the following official statement:

"Mrs. Ambrose J. Small and Dr. B. G. Connolly, managing director of the Capital Trust Corporation, today had a conference with J. A. C. Cameron, official referee, to whom the administration of the estate of the late Mr. Small has been referred, and discussed the matter of taking immediately further steps to bring to light the whereabouts of the missing secretary of the estate, Mr. John Doughty, before the courts of Toronto.

The reward which was printed will be issued far and wide and sent to every police centre throughout the world in the hope that some definite information about Doughty may be discovered. The mentioning of a definite charge on the reward will give the police power to arrest Doughty at sight and hold him for the Toronto authorities.

Now that the Capital Trust Association of Ottawa have assumed direction of affairs and have, under the authority of the estate, money to spend in an endeavor to clear up the mystery, more action may be expected in the search for Mr. Small and interesting developments may transpire at any moment. Orthodoxy in the unraveling of crime will be set aside and up-to-date and scientific methods used in following some of the few clues there are in the case.

DOMINION PERMANENT'S AFFAIRS REQUIRE TIME

Report to Ontario Government That Assets Are of Such Nature as to Preclude Possibility of Quick Settlement—Railroad is Most Important Possession.

During the recent session of the legislature, the attorney-general promised the house he would have a report from the assignees, E. R. C. Clarkson & Sons, on the affairs of the defunct Dominion Permanent Loan Company. It was received yesterday by the department, and, besides giving a complete account of the affairs of the company, tells what steps are being taken to wind it up. The report is as follows:

"I am in receipt of your letter of the 29th ultimo, for which I am obliged. In reply thereto, would state that I shall be very pleased to receive any suggestions which will assist us towards the winding up of this estate, for it is always before us that the sooner the winding up can be completed the better for all concerned. Personally, however, I do not see how any greater speed can be made than at present, having regard to the fact that the assets of the estate consist almost wholly of the following:

(a) A railroad in the state of Washington.

(b) Claims against directors for misfeasance.

(c) Claims against stockholders for repayment of dividends.

(d) Claims against stockholders on what is known as 'treasury' stock.

BRITAIN FALLING BEHIND AS A POWER IN THE AIR

London, June 8.—The Air League of the British Empire, which is to educate public opinion upon the importance of air power, was inaugurated at the Mansion House today, when General Seely said that in 1918 we were incomparably the best equipped in the air of all nations, but that today the position was indeed serious. The state had practically gone out of business, and private industry had stopped a full stop, whereas in Germany eighteen large firms were preparing for the rapid development of aviation.

PLAGUE IN VERA CRUZ SAID TO BE DECREASING

Vera Cruz, June 8.—Only four new cases of bubonic plague, in three deaths, were reported Sunday and Monday. It appears certain that the epidemic is decreasing in intensity, and it is hoped that, with the arrival of medical aid from New Orleans and the sanitary measures taken, the disease will be wiped out completely. The city, which was much alarmed, is again tranquil.

EARTHQUAKE IN FORMOSA

Tokio, June 8.—A severe earthquake shock occurred thruout Formosa Sunday, according to advices received today. The centre of the disturbance was near Ywaleon on the eastern coast. There were some casualties, and damage to buildings.

DATE OF ONTARIO REFERENDUM PROBABLY MONDAY, OCTOBER 25

Ottawa, June 8.—By Canadian Press.—Authority has been given to the secretary of state to make such preliminary arrangements as may be necessary for the holding of a liquor referendum in the province of Ontario. The precise date of the plebiscite has not yet been determined, but it will probably be on Monday, Oct. 25, the same date as has been fixed for Saskatchewan.
