NEW GERMAN GOVERNMENT OFFERS COMPROMISE WITH OLD

DOUBTS CANADA'S POWER TO ENFORCE EIGHT-HOUR DAY

Important Statement by Hon. C. J. Doherty in House of Commons.

Ottawa, March 15.—(By Canadian Press).—Renewed discussion on the eight-hour day and a lively debate on pensions led today's proceedings in the house. The eight-hour question did not arise till the evening session.

BRITAIN TO ADMIT RED DELEGATION

Lloyd George Announces Co-operative Delegates Will Receive Permission. London, March 15.—Replying to a question in the house of commons today, Mr. Lloyd George announced that the government would permit the visit of a delegation of the Russian co-operative societies.

IMPERIALS FOR CANADA

One Hundred British Soldiers Apply for Settlement on Farms of the Dominion. Ottawa, March 15.—The soldier settlement board has been advised by its London, England, office that the committee sent to England to select imperial veterans for settlement in Canada is now operating.

POLICE AND MILITARY GUARD IRISH JUDGES

Belfast, March 15.—Judges Dodd and Gibson, sitting at the Queen's assizes at Lifford court house today, were escorted by police armed with machine guns and revolvers.

WILL ADMINISTER GERMAN COLONIES

London, March 15.—Mr. Lloyd George today in the house of commons announced that the following mandates had been allocated: German East Africa; German Britain and Belgium; German Southwest Africa to the Union of South Africa; German possessions in the Pacific ocean south of the equator, other than Samoa, to the Commonwealth of Australia; Samoa to New Zealand and the German islands north of the equator to Japan.

TEST JURISDICTION OF COMMERCE BOARD IN SUPREME COURT

O'Connor Asserts Right of Parliament to Control Trade in Extraordinary Times. DEFENCE CASE TODAY

Ottawa, March 15.—(By Canadian Press).—Government counsel in the application to test the jurisdiction of the board of commerce rested their case last today, and counsel, who are challenging the constitutionality of the combines and fair prices act, commenced argument which will take place most of Tuesday in the supreme court. The questions submitted to the supreme court are as follows:

SNATCHED MONEY FROM LITTLE BOY'S HAND

William Duthoit, aged 15, of 32 Denison Park avenue, was arrested last evening by Policeman Buchanan charged with robbery. The police stated Duthoit, watched Frank Steele, a ten-year-old boy living at 133 Greenwood avenue, enter a grocery store with a ten dollar bill. When the boy came out, Duthoit is alleged to have snatched \$5 of the money from Steele's hand and run. The boy's cries attracted Policeman Buchanan who took up the chase and after a short sprint he arrested Duthoit.

HOLLAND TO GUARD EX-KAISER WELL

Castle of Amerongen is Watched Strictly to Prevent Possible Escape. Amsterdam, March 15.—The former German emperor was up early this morning. He seemed much calmer and sawed wood from 9 o'clock to noon. The former empress is well again. The guard about the castle is very strict. A high placed government official assured the Associated Press today: "The allies and the world may safely rely upon Holland to guard the ex-king, tho no more measures will be taken than are necessary to prevent his escape."

CRUX OF COVENANT CARRIES IN SENATE OVER TWO TO ONE

Fourteen Democrats Line Up With Republicans to Give Two-Thirds Vote.

MAY NOT RATIFY PACT

Washington, March 15.—Reaffirming its disagreement with President Wilson on the dominating issue of the peace treaty controversy, the senate adopted today by a vote of more than two to one the new article ten reservation framed by Republican leaders. Its action brought to an end, at least for the present, the protracted effort for a compromise that would insure ratification, and the senate's decision was accepted generally as hastening the treaty toward another deadlock from which it could be released only by a verdict at the polls next November.

FREIGHT SERVICE TO SOUTH AFRICA

First Ship to Inaugurate New Line Leaves Montreal in May. Montreal, March 15.—A. E. Cook, assistant manager here of the Elder Dempster Line, who has just returned from a visit to England, reports that West African merchants in London have received favorably the plans of his company to inaugurate a freight service between Montreal and the west coast of Africa. If Canadian can meet competition in prices and put up the right kind of commodities, assurance was given that the merchants in London would be able to support the new trade route. The ship to inaugurate the service will leave Montreal in the last week of May and will be followed by another in two months' time. There is to be a direct return service.

TWO YOUNG GIRLS HELD AS SHOPLIFTERS

Two well-known characters in the police, Katherine Masten and Ella Parks, both of 43 Hamilton street, were arrested yesterday afternoon in a downtown store charged with shoplifting. Katherine Masten was the girl who made the sensational escape from the Toronto jail with Vera De Lavelle, the woman who figured prominently in the Frank McCullough murder case. The Masten and Lavelle women were being held on remand and were hanging clothes in the court yard when they placed a ladder against the wall and climbed over to the street.

LUETTZWITZ ONE OF 'KAISER'S GANG'

Washington, March 15.—Gen. Von Luetwitz, commanding the military forces of the new government in Germany, was described today as "one of the Kaiser's old gang" by Herbert Hoover, who said he had found it necessary to deal with the officer during the war as one of the principal German military officials in occupied Belgium.

VALUABLE JEWELRY STOLEN BY THIEVES FROM APARTMENT

Gained an Entrance by Climbing Sill and Smashing Window.

MAKE CLEAR GET-AWAY

Forcing their way into the suite of rooms of Mrs. Kate M. Perrin, apartment 16, Queen's Court, Apartments, 575 Jarvis street, last night, burglars made good their escape with between \$600 and \$700 worth of jewelry. Mrs. Perrin is 32 years of age, and lived in the apartment alone. She very seldom goes out, but last evening, at 8 o'clock to find her apartment robbed and the contents of the rooms broken.

THIEVES BROKE WINDOW

The apartment broken into, is situated in the rear of the main floor. By climbing up on the window sill the thieves broke the window close by the window latch and unlocked it they entered. Going into the bedroom they first opened the dresser drawers and removed two jewel boxes. Breaking these open they took two gold watches, which had been purchased by Mrs. Perrin's late husband 30 years ago by his father. Eight valuable rings were also taken as well as a number of bracelets; a diamond necklace, a brooch and other articles. The gold watches had been in the Perrin family, Mrs. Perrin stated last night, for over 50 years.

Another Daring Robbery

Sunday night a daring robbery took place in the home of Sherman A. Ficht, 85 Howland avenue. Breaking a side window, thieves entered the house and stole \$200 worth of jewelry and other valuables. KAPP OFFERS OLIVE BRANCH EBERT TO RETAIN PRESIDENCY UNTIL THE NEW ELECTIONS

Compromise As Proposed By the Kapp Government

Cabinet of Professional Ministers, Election of President By People, Ebert to Retain Office in Meanwhile.

Berlin, March 15.—The Kapp government has issued a declaration that negotiations have been opened with the old government, at the request of the latter. No confirmation of this, however, has been received from the Ebert government. The declaration says that a cabinet will be formed of professional ministers, including professional ministers of the old government; new elections for the reichstag and the Prussian national assembly will be held within two months, and subsequently an election for "imperial president" by the people themselves. The present "imperial president" shall be asked to continue in office until this election is held. A second chamber of labor will be formed by the extension of the economic ministry and of the employes' councils. The new and old governments shall issue a joint declaration that under present conditions a general strike is a crime against the German people. Until a decision is taken on these proposals, the imperial chancellor renounces the formation of a new ministry and charges the senior state under-secretaries with the direction of affairs. Meanwhile it is reliably learned that the under-secretaries of all the ministers unanimously refused this morning to take orders from the new government, but announced that they would remain at their posts and continue to conduct the business of the country according to the program of the old government.

CANADA TO HAVE SEVERAL ARE KILLED PLENIPOTENTIARY IN BERLIN SUBURBS

Understood Dominion to Be Hand Grenades Thrown in Represented at Washington Front of General Luetwitz's Headquarters.

London, March 15.—The Daily Mail understands that the long outstanding question of Canadian representation at Washington at last has been settled by agreement of the foreign office to the appointment of a Canadian minister plenipotentiary, who will be immediately under the British ambassador to the United States, and in the absence of the ambassador, in charge of the embassy. The Daily Mail in allusion to the importance and difficulties of the British ambassador at Washington, indicates Canada's relationship to the United States in regard to the league of nations as the kind of delicate situation it has in mind, and it trusts the government will take the first opportunity to reaffirm the national status which the overseas dominions hold as by right of the league. The paper thinks Canada's special interest in Anglo-American relations has received remarkable emphasis by the British government's assent to the appointment of a Canadian minister at Washington.

MENTION ROWELL

Ottawa, March 15.—It is believed here that if a Canadian representative is to be sent to Washington, as the British ambassador at Berlin, Hon. N. W. Rowell would be available for the position. Mr. Rowell would not object to such a temporary withdrawal from Canadian politics.

RETRIBUTION FOR THIEVES

Ottawa, March 15.—(Special).—A report to the effect that the Grand Trunk arbitration proceedings will not commence until September is current here. It is claimed that the information, data and inspections necessary to the case cannot be secured before that date.

There will not likely be any announcement for a few days as to the Grand Trunk Railway board of management, or the board of arbitration.

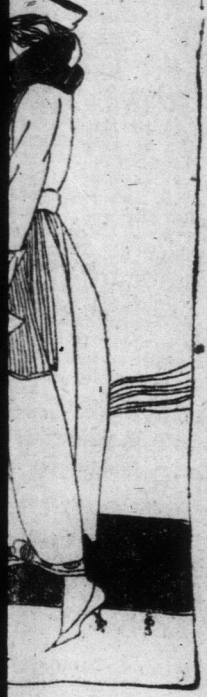
