"Although a comparatively young man Judge Lindsey has attracted the attention of the civilized world by the way in which he has solved the problem of dealing with boys, who, in the course of his early legal career came before the county court at Denver for numerous petty offences. His system of dealing with this class of offences took shape in 1900 when the juvenile court was stablished, and through the working of which thousands of boys have been saved from becoming criminals and are living honorable and useful lives.

In connection with the work of the league Judge Lindsey has succeeded in causing the passage in Colorado of a contributory delinquent law against adults by which negligent parents, guardians and employers are held accountable for the petty criminal acts of boys—a measure which is doing great good in holding parents and those having the care of children responsible for the acts of those under their charge.

"The juvenile court is exerting a powerful influence for good upon inpressionable young minds. This work is in accordance with the wisdom expressed in the old phrase: As the twig is bent the tree is inclined. It occupies a field peculiarly fruitful when good seed is sown.

"The national capital is one of the places in which the juvenile court system has met with great succeess. The judge of this court in Washington is William H. DeLacy and during the short time he has been at its head it is impossible to forecast the total of good accomplished or of evil averted by his administration.

"At present, according to a late number of the Washington Post, Judge De-Lacy has under his charge about 300 children who are required to report to him weekly as to their doings and way of life. He devotes his entire time to these children, who are the raw material from which criminals are usually made. Judge DeLacy has the assistance of only two probation officers, who are almost overwhelmed with the details of their work. Congress has been asked to make a moderate allowance for more assistance, and all who are familiar with the situation are hopeful that the request will be



# Grand Mere is one of the most flourishing little towns in the Province of Quebec, with a population of about 5,500 people, and a business activity far greater than that of many towns of much larger size. This prosperity is due almost entirely to the operation of the big paper mill which is the centre of the town's industry. It may at first sight seem incredible that one paper mill should be able to establish and build up such a community, but those who understand how many men are employed about a large paper mill, how much it costs in general to make a ton of paper, will not be astonished. The Laurentide Paper Company which operates the mill at Grand Mere employed last year during the summer months 1,075 men. Much of their work is skilled labor, and the total sum paid in wages and salaries last year amounted to about \$680,000. Account must also be taken of the number of men employed indirectly by the Company as contractors, jobbers and workmen. These would average about 1800 Hon. 

We are glad that the government lent no support to the resolution in favor of a universal eight hour day to be established by law which Mr. Clynes moved last night. There are, we admit, many trades in which the existing hours are most unduly long and many in which an eight hour day could be introduced with advantage. But the essentials of Mr. Clynes' resolution were universality and state enactment, and these things are impracticable. How could any state in its senses apply that law to agriculture, and what result would the law have if it did? "Nature" as Mr. Samuel said, "does not obey parliament." Nor would the necessary economic conditions in trades conform to it either. Mr. Clynes sought to avoid practical difficulties by asking the House to accept the resolution "merely as a statement of principle."
