Fulton wants to meet Sam Langford. When Fred delivered the fight blow that sent him to the hospital in New York and sent him back to Minnesota he brought down on his head the scorn of all the New York fans. They haven't yet stopped talking about it.

Fulton seems to be the ideal man to meet Jess Willard for the championship. In spite of the unfortunate outcome of his affair with Carl Morris, Fulton still looks as the most logical man. Morris flattered when he made such a poor showing with Willard, but he has never been out of the running for a long time.

Fulton is a fighter of ability. He was learning fast when he ran into the rough-house methods of Morris. If he should get Sam into the ring and beat the veteran negro, there would be one ready to say he wasn't at least half ready for the big fight.

Fulton couldn't come back with merely a point victory over the crafty black. While it would get back some of his lost prestige, it wouldn't necessarily entitle him to any further consideration. He would have to score a knockout, and he wouldn't do to make it a halfway affair.

Champion Smith once whipped Sam Langford, the records show, but he was foolish enough to try it again and the result was a defeat for Smith. Langford sometimes fights wonderfully well; at other times he can be out-pointed. But the white man has never been found - nor the black one either - for that matter - good enough to stop Langford. Jack Johnson never would meet him after he gained the championship. Others have avoided him by drawing a colored champion.

Fulton will meet him on the ground that mixed bouts should not be held, but, just the same, Fulton will meet him back if he is good enough to put over the proper punch.

BASEBALL AND THE WAR

(By Joe Page) Baseball, to say the least, is a peculiar institution. While it is the one great game of the American public, it has probably more ups and downs than all other field sports combined. But today standing on the brink as the National Baseball Association formed in 1907 stood upon, in March 1907, just before the Civil War started, the game of baseball is still today, as it was then, seventy years ago, "the national game of America."
