Charles O'Dell is Victim; Andrew and Thomas Galbraith Rescued

The opening of the lobster fishing season yesterday was marked by a sad fatality when Charles Oliver O'Dell, of Lorneville, lost his life while hauling in his traps off the East Head lighthouse, near Musquash, in the Bay of Fundy, as he and two companions were thrown into the rough sea by a comber which capsized their fishing

It was only the quick action of Joseph Galbraith, lighthouse keeper, who witnessed the accident, that prevented further loss of life. The sea was very rough along the coast when Mr. O'Dell with his two brothers-in-law, Andrew and Thomas Galbraith, also of Lorne-ville, set out in their boat yesterday

At 11.45 o'clock the fishermen started to pull in their traps and as the boat was slightly listed to one side a large sea struck the boat and turned it over, throwing the men into the water.

STRUCK ON HEAD

As the boat turned, Mr. O'Dell was struck on the head by the craft and rendered unconscious. He did not have time to sink under the surface as his companions caught hold of his clothing
