NATIONAL DIRECTOR IN FINE ADDRESS

J. H. Crocker Tells Y's Men of Athletic Situation—Is Heartily Thanked

J. H. Crocker, of Toronto, national director of physical education for the Y. M. C. A. addressed the Y's Men's Club at their weekly luncheon yesterday. Having had considerable experience in all lines of athletics, Mr. Crocker's remarks bore much weight and were listened to with much interest.

He reviewed in general the work of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, giving an outline of the work as it is today, with its tremendous number of athletes to look after. There are in Canada today 80,000 registered athletes and twice that many more, said Mr. Crocker, taking part in different lines of sport that are not registered.

He spoke of the great strides made recently in women's athletics, the purpose being to let them have full control of their own affairs. It is felt, he said, that in the past women's sports have been exploited for commercial gain rather than for the upbuilding of a strong and healthy body. The purpose of this "parliament of sport" now meeting in Saint John, said the speaker, is to set down fundamental principles now, that in the future, will give the coming generations a better playground, more for health and vigor and less for gain.
