ONDON, Feb. 12.—Premier Mussolini's Fascist nationalism inevitably will lead to war, according to Professor Gaetano Salvemini, formerly of Florence University, whose opinion of the Fascist government compelled him to leave Italy.

"I don't know how long the Fascist regime will remain in power, but if it does remain, the Fascists' fanaticism undoubtedly will bring war," said Salvemini in an interview with the United News.
