

\$200,000 N.B. CHURCH BURNS

Catholic Edifice at Tracadie Is Totally Destroyed by Flames

Was One of Finest in County Known For Its Splendid Churches

BATHURST, Nov. 9.—The beautiful Catholic church at Tracadie was totally destroyed by fire last evening about 7.30 o'clock. The value of the building is placed at \$200,000 and the loss is partly covered by insurance. The church, one of the finest in Gloucester county, noted for fine churches, was of freestone construction and beautifully finished throughout. The origin of the fire is unknown.

UNABLE TO SAVE IT.
Early in the evening the residents of Tracadie were startled by the report that the large church was on fire. A great crowd gathered quickly but it was impossible to battle with the flames. The building was well equipped. It was lighted with electric lights. A new pipeless furnace had been recently installed.

Much sympathy is expressed for Father Lavasseur, the venerable pastor of Tracadie. No plans have yet been announced as to rebuilding. Tracadie is one of the largest centres of the county.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The House of Lords as a judicial body has dismissed the appeal of George Ricketts, recorder of Portsmouth, who raised the question of whether he was entitled to deduct his expenses from his official salary in making a return of his income tax. Ricketts in England correspond somewhat to the county court judges in Canada and are usually appointed from among the barristers who can reasonably hope eventually to receive full judicial honors.

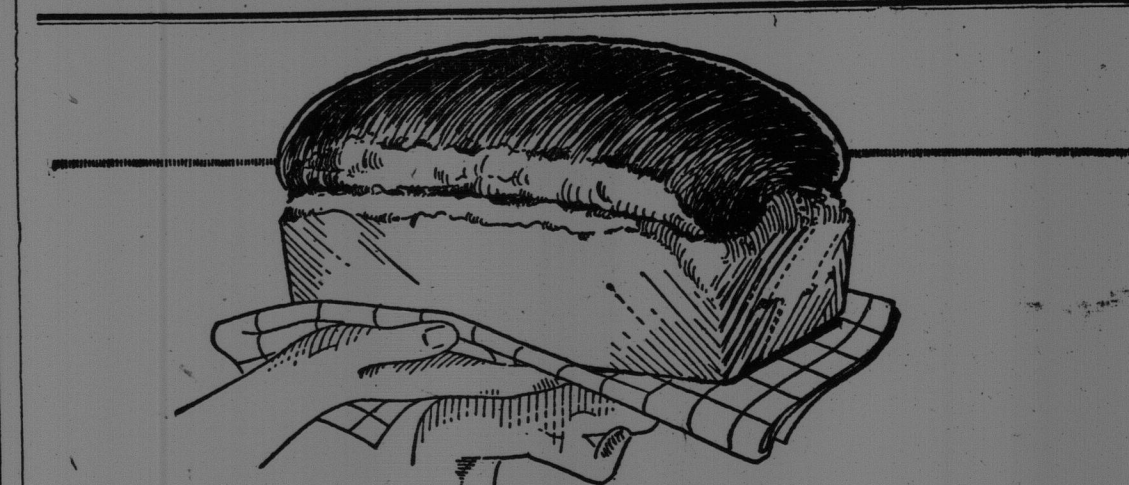

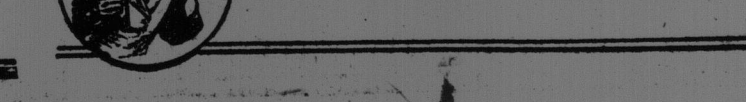

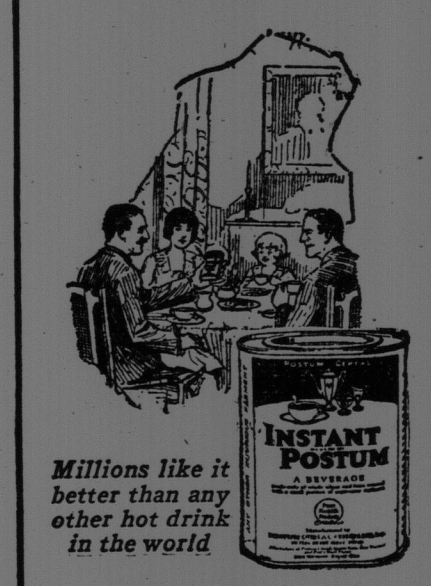
