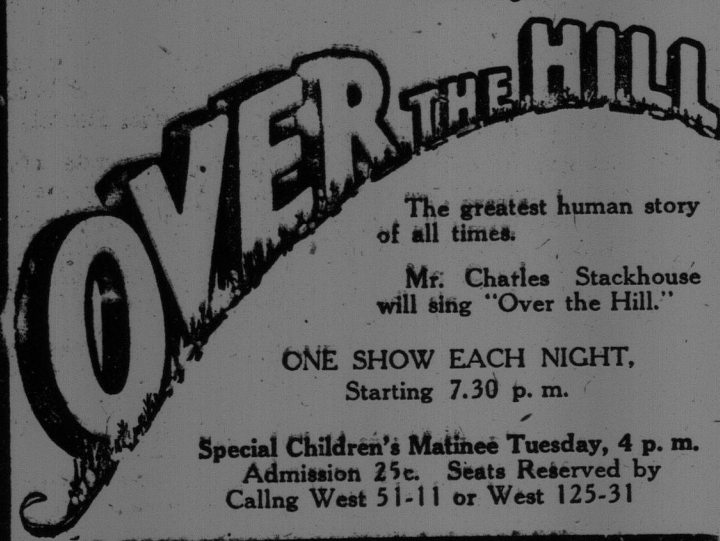

Supreme Court last week.

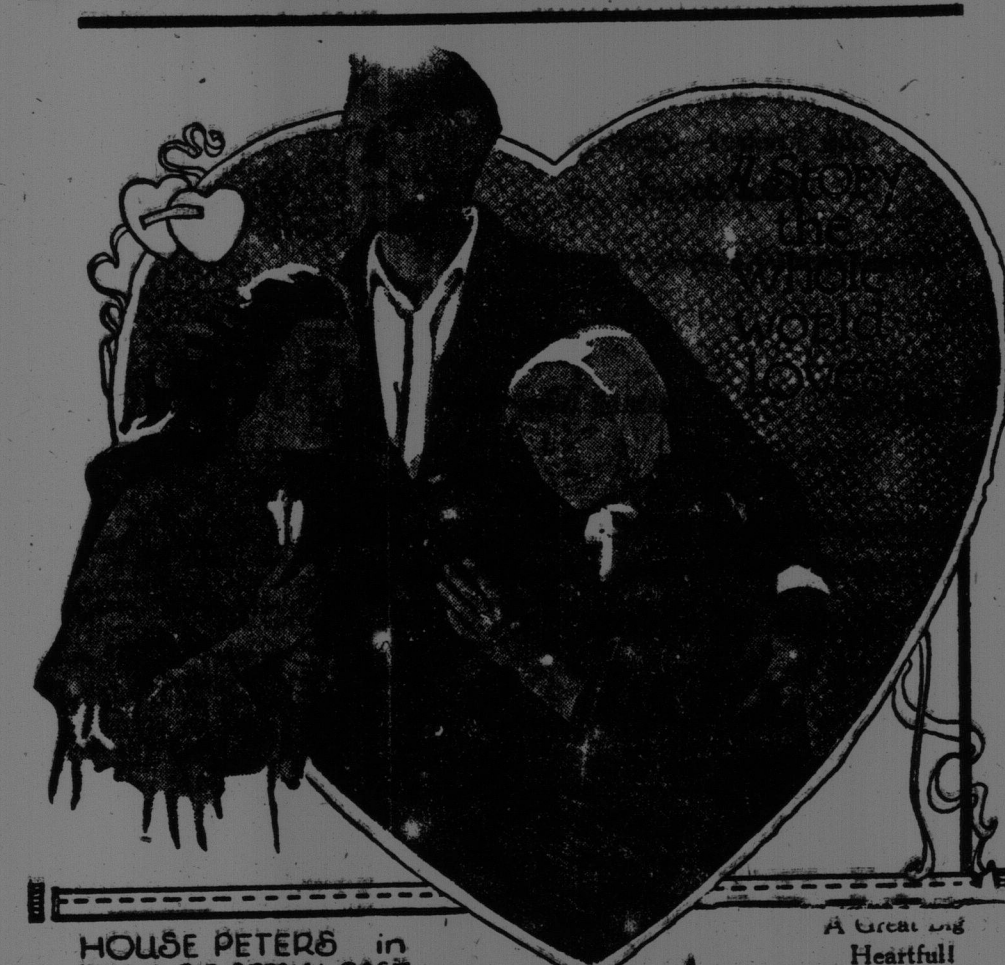
According to Louis S. Hirsch, as was

PAID FINE THEN WANTED IT BACK

Russian at Oshawa Wanted
His Money Back as He
Preferred to Go to Jail.

Oshawa, Ont., Nov. 27.—Appearing
before Magistrate Hind in Police Court
yesterday, Daniel Gilevitch, a Russian,
facing a charge of theft, Daniel Gile-
vitch, Oshawa Street, a Russian, was
fined \$10 and costs with the alternative
of 30 days in jail. He was jointly
charged with another foreigner, George
Gregg, with stealing a quantity of
apples from Harold Tonkin, Ritzon
Road. Gregg escaped with a \$5 fine
when he pleaded guilty. Gilevitch was
assessed \$10 and costs, amounting to
\$15, when he pleaded not guilty and
was convicted.

All smiles Gilevitch paid the fine. He
then went home but one hour later he
presented himself at the police station
and requested that he be given his man-
ey back and permitted to serve the
term. Constable Venton, who was on
duty when the unusual request was
made, did not comply, however, stating
that the magistrate would have to be
consulted. Gilevitch departed vowing
his intention of appearing in the morn-
ing and starting his term.

NELSON'S FLAGSHIP MAY TRAVEL BY LAND

London, Nov. 26.—(A. P., by mail).—
An effort is being made in England to
raise \$500,000 for the preservation of
the Victory, Nelson's flagship in the
Battle of Trafalgar.

The famous vessel is at present at
Portsmouth, in a very bad state of re-
pair. So far has she deteriorated that,
if it is decided to bring her to London,
she will have to come overland; she
could not undergo the journey by
water.
