**PROJECT FOR A BIG MOVEMENT BY METHODISTS**  
Detroit, Nov. 17.—Appeals for a world wide militant campaign to bring Christianity to the National Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church by speakers representing each of the five great continents.

The appeal merged into a single call intended to bring what was described as the most extensive religious movement in the history of Methodism.

Speakers stressed the importance of the facilities for carrying on work of missionaries in Africa, Asia, Europe and South America and for extending the work in North America.
