structed.

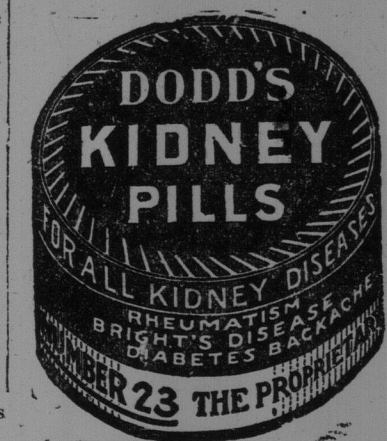
