THREE-STORY FLATS

The question of three-story flats was discussed at the annual meeting of the National Housing Association of the United States in December last. Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston, in the course of an address told of efforts made in that city to improve the tenement house law and provide for its better enforcement and for better housing conditions generally. Then he said:

"We have tried to secure the passage of an act which will make impossible the three-story flat. That is the curse of an act which will make impossible the three-story flat. That is the curse of our part of the country, and I am very happy to say that where the people have had a chance to record themselves on this proposition, they have voted that the three-story tenement house should not be built. The act, which applies to towns, was passed by the Massachusetts legislature last year. Three of the towns in the neighborhood of Boston have already accepted it, and this type of construction, which menaces life and property in and about our city, will be impossible on our outskirts. 
