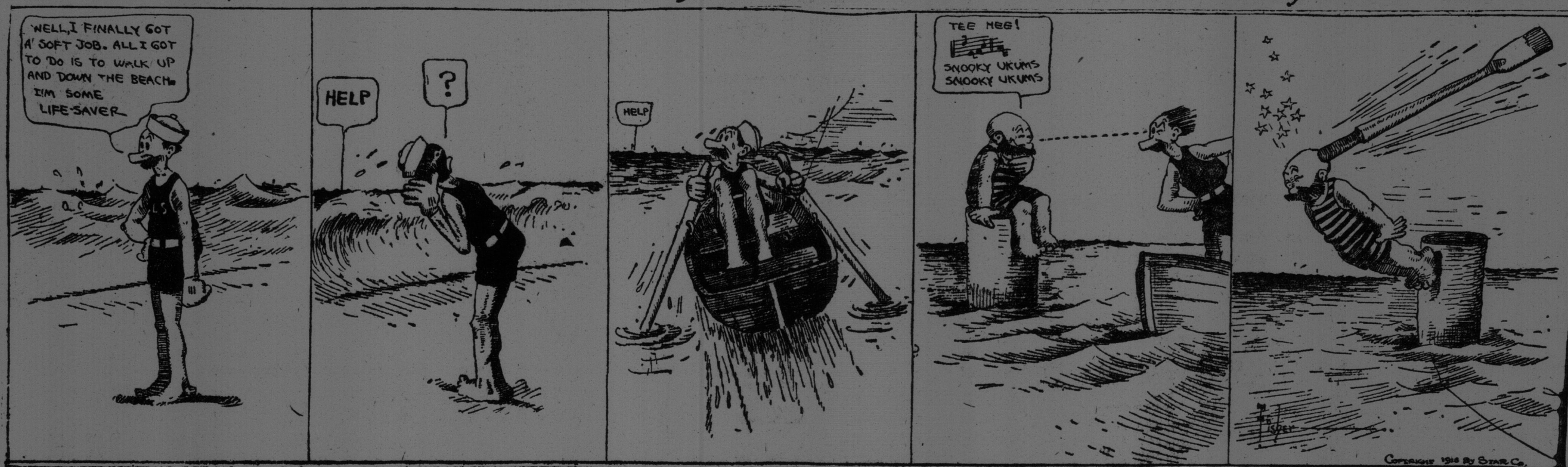


This Is Apt to Cause Mutt to Lose His Job
