MONEY MARKETS

ALL ARE SHOWING

IMPROVEMENT

New York, Aug. 2.—All the money
markets of the world, those at home
equally with those abroad, show im-
provement and an easier tendency. This
must be attributed to a universal
strengthening of banking conditions by
the enforced contraction of loans. The
latter was an unwelcome process, in-
volving a worldwide slowing down of
business activities, a fall in values of
both commodities and securities, and a
very pronounced check upon new en-
terprises and new applications for cap-
ital. It is now thoroughly recognized
that this enforced slowing down of
business, the chief source of trouble
has been the Balkan war. The cost and
the losses of this bitter struggle are es-
timated to have been over \$1,200,000,
which fell upon money markets al-
ready exhausted by an undue expansion
of credit and an enormous demand for
new capital. The period of retrenchment
thus enforced has proved highly ben-
eficial; and now that the main source
of strain—the Balkan war—is over, con-
servative recuperation should be the in-
evitable sequence, and may prove even
more rapid than expected or desired. If
unfavorable circumstances do not in-
tervene. The continued belligerency of
the various contestants is having one
effect, it is wearing European bank-
ers of financing such petty wars.

It is exceedingly satisfactory to note
that the United States is exhibiting
greater recuperative tendencies than any
other commercial nation. This is but
natural. Our losses from the war were
strictly indirect. Instead of reveling in
a trade boom such as England and
Germany have enjoyed for the last four
or five years, we have pursued with
unequivocal degree of realness a policy
of extreme conservatism, especially the
last two years at least, which disappointing
in years been in a better position for
responding to a fresh forward movement.
Witness the extraordinary report of the
United States Steel Corporation, always
a fair barometer of trade conditions; also
the continued liberal advances of our
railroad proving that there has been no
important recession in traffic; also the
satisfactory reports issued from time to
time by many of our large industrial es-
tablishments.

The most important element in our
favor is the prospect of a fine harvest.
As usual, there are complaints of injury,
but these are generally local and not of
a serious nature. If present prospects
are realized, we may harvest a bumper
crop over 3,000,000,000 bushels of wheat,
or about a bumper crop of wheat, or
about 750,000,000 bushels; also the sec-
ond largest yield of cotton, amounting
to over 14,000,000 bales. August is usu-
ally a month of deterioration for corn
and cotton, so that no alarm need be
excited at any moderate injury. But the
growing season is rapidly reaching its
close; conditions are generally above
average, and making allowance for cus-
tomary deterioration, we are almost
sure to see a harvest considerably above
the average. It is unnecessary to dwell
upon this as a telling factor in our con-
fidence.

Secretary McAdoo's offer, as reported,
to deposit government funds up to \$50,
000,000 will of course have a reassuring
effect upon many minds, especially at
the west, but the announcement, I
think, is probably premature and such
action may become unnecessary and it
is to be hoped it will.

MILITARY DISCIPLINE
FOR INMATES OF JAIL

Instructor Will Teach Guards Drill and
They Will Teach Prisoners

Montreal, Aug. 4.—Henceforth pris-
oners, who are temporary guests of the
government at the Bordeaux Jail will
get a taste of militarism for military
rule to prevail at the million dollar
institution. The government has taken
steps to engage Captain Landriault,
many years police instructor, to inaugu-
rate the new system. He is under in-
structions to start in work first with the
guards. These will be whipped into line,
submitted to drill and their whole
strength placed under military disci-
pline. The guards in turn will be called
upon to establish military discipline
amongst the men under their charge,
and drilling, marching and physical ex-
ercises will become a daily feature of the
stay of the inmates in the institution.

EVERY ONE IN TEN
LOSES APPENDIX

Colbrook, N. H., Aug. 4.—In this town
of 2,000 inhabitants more than 200 per-
sons have very recently undergone op-
erations for appendicitis, a record which
is not equalled by any five towns com-
bined in the White Mountains. Opera-
tions continue at the rate of about two
a week, and in many instances diners
and dances are arranged either before
and after the patient's convalescence in
celebration of another name enrolled on
the appendicitis list. The place has
been dubbed locally "the appendicitis
town."

SENTENCE BOY TO

DEATH FOR MURDER

Youth May Save Life Though He
is Guilty of Awful Crime

Paris, Aug. 3.—The assize court on
Auzerre has sentenced to death G. von
Pierard, a boy of
