

The arrival of the fire apparatus frightened the rest of the tenants into quitting the building with what belongings they could gather together.

New York, Feb. 17.—After she had removed her shoes and stockings to show the difference between a swollen ankle and a normal one, a jury in the Hudson County Circuit Court, Jersey City, awarded Miss Mary L.
