## BASE BALL

When is it possible to score a run on a double play that retires the side?

It is always possible to score a run on any double play that retires the side, provided the third out is not a force-out or a play in which the third man out is retired before reaching first base.

To illustrate: There are runners on first and third and one out. The batsman hits a difficult drive to right field that looks as if it would fall safe. The runner on first, playing good baseball, decides to hold that base on the theory that if the ball is caught he can beat the throw to the plate.

The runner on first, feeling sure the ball will not be caught, runs wild. The fielder makes the catch and the runner on third breaks for home. When the ball is caught the runner originally a first has reached second.

The fielder throws the ball to first before the runner can return, completing a double play and retiring the side. On all double plays of this nature the runner can score from third, if he held his base until the ball was caught and crossed the plate before the double play which retired the side was completed.

There was no force about the third out. A force can only occur when the runner must vacate a base to make room for the batsman. The third out was made possible by bad baserunning. Just remember, a run can always score on any double play in which the
