**NEW NATIVE CORN IN MARKET TODAY**

Berries and Garden Produce in Good Supply—The Retail Prices

The appearance of new native corn and a good supply of native berries and green goods were the features of the local retail city market this morning. There was a noticeable increase in the supply of lamb and poultry. New potatoes were also plentiful and were quoted at from 40 to 50 cents a peck. There was an exceptionally heavy supply of berries. Raspberries and blueberries were selling at 20 cents a quart, while strawberries, which were scarce, were 25 cents.  
Meat and poultry prices were given as follows: Fowl, 40 to 45 cents a pound; chicken, 50 to 55 cents; lamb, 25 to 45; real, 12 to 15; beef, 18 to 25; and pork, 25 to 35 cents.  
In eggs, fresh extras sold at 45 cents a dozen, and fresh firsts at 40 cents. Dairy butter was offering at 38 to 42 cents a pound, and creamery at 45 cents. There was little change in prices in green goods from those prevailing last week, with a slight decline, if anything. There was the usual fine display of flowers today.

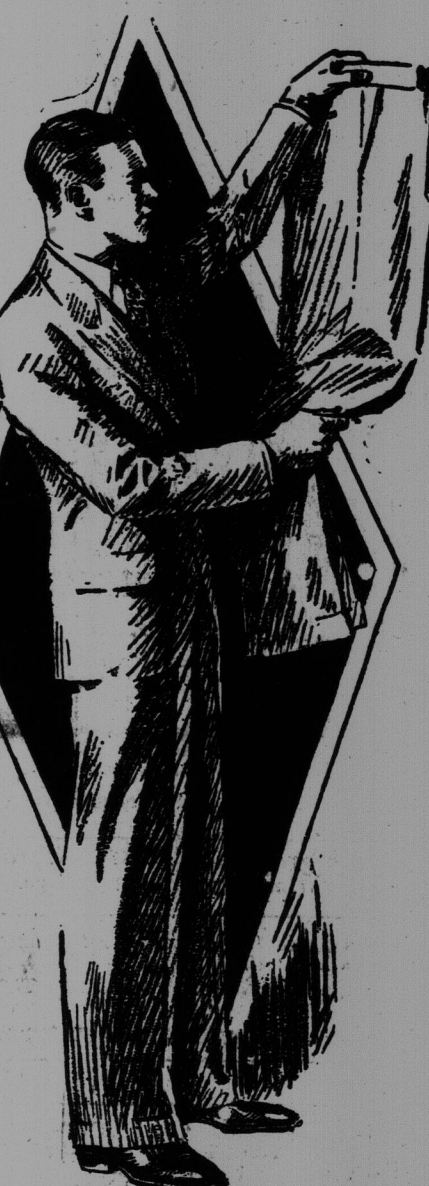
