THE MARITIME PROVINCES

The Montreal Star has an article more than a column in length based on a statement of a Montreal newspaper and the Boston papers, in regard to emigration from the Maritime Provinces.

The Star takes the alleged exodus from the Maritime Provinces as the text for a long dissertation on the emigration of the public money in these provinces, and makes the inquiry why the people of the Maritime Provinces have not been so successful in their emigration.

With regard to the statement of the Star that it costs the country \$500,000 to \$600,000 more than the government receives for transporting coal over the Intercolonial Railway to the upper provinces, we can only say that we do not believe it, and if the Star has any good authority for such a statement it should give it.
