GETTING BETTER. Nobby Storm Ulster

If the World is not Christianity is a Failure.

So Said Rev. H. W. Crews in the Victoria Avenue Church.

If it be true that the world is not growing better, then Christianity is a failure. So said Rev. H. W. Crews in the Victoria Ave. Methodist church last evening in the course of an eloquent sermon. "Watchman, what of the night?" were the words of the text, and the question was one which concerned the world of to-day no less than in the days of old. We knew something of the signs of the sky; we can weather from the appearance of the heavens, but it behooves us to know whether we are tending.

The speaker briefly outlined the advancement, along purely material lines, that has marked the centuries that have passed under the Christian dispensation, in none of which had the progress of science and invention been more marked than in the century now drawing to a close. The telegraph, the telephone and the modern means of locomotion were dwelt upon particularly and their relation to the moral status of mankind was briefly pointed out. These advances had made increased good possible; but it was also true that they had opened up new and improved avenues to crime.

There were those who said that the world was growing worse; others who declared that it was growing better; but Rev. Mr. Crews' opinion was that it was growing both better and worse. Good and evil had marched forward on parallel lines; but the increase of good was in far greater ratio than the increase of evil. Two men visit the same city. One comes back and tells of the wickedness of that city and is sure that the world is growing worse. The other speaks of it as a place of magnificent churches filled with devout and pious congregations; he feels convinced that the world is growing better. And so it is: men who look for the good will find on every hand reasons for rejoicing, while those who seek the slums and visit the haunts and dens of iniquity may well lament over the things he sees and hears. The speaker looked at the world from his standpoint and was happy in the conviction that, while good and bad are increasing, the progress and growth of good far exceeds that of evil.

M'KEE AGAIN THE CHOICE

To the surprise of even himself W. J. McKee, M.P.P., was re-nominated by the Liberals of North Essex on Saturday. The first ballot resulted as follows: W. J. McKee 66; R. F. The latter did not make the nomination unanimous and trouble followed.

LAW'S IRON HAND

Will Sternly Put Down Rowdiness in Chatham.

The P. M. Says He Notices an Improvement Already—Police Court Cases.

There was another Monday police court docket this morning, and Judge Houston was, as usual, considerably busy.

George Summers, Alfred Alexander, John Perry and James Hollings, the quartette of lads convicted of disorderly conduct on the streets on Sunday week, told the judge that they were all at church yesterday and had started out to steadily reform.

The judge expressed his pleasure with the improved condition of affairs. "Yesterday," he said, "was one of the most quiet and orderly Sabbaths I have yet seen in Chatham. Why, one could actually pass the C. P. R. corner yesterday, without being under the impression they were dodging through a byway."

The judge assessed Summers, Alexander and Hollings \$1 and costs, while Perry was allowed to go with a warning. He, however, emphatically said that the next offenders would be much more severely dealt with.

Vic Parent charged Coyne with malicious injury to property to the extent of \$1. Thos. Scullard defended the accused.

The complainant's story was to the effect that both himself and defendant occupied a building on Fifth street jointly and that defendant forced an entrance through his portion of the building and with an axe injured an obstructing door which complainant had fastened.

The defence maintained that the right of way had been given Coyne at the agreement and that he had used the door without protest for four months.

Judgement was reserved for a week.

N. Cloutier, of Montreal, will be at the Montana House on Friday, Saturday and Monday, for the purchase of all kinds of horses.

On Park avenue east there is a bad mud hole. The Park avenue and Duke street sewers come within about 300 feet of each other, and the water stop. Drainage to relieve this spot is being urged upon the board of works.

Raleigh street sidewalk, upon which Mr. Cassidy fell and broke his leg on Thursday night, is said to have been among the walks condemned by Inspector Delahanty in March last.

It is claimed that there is a combine among the pork packers, and that they will only purchase hogs from their own agents who control certain districts. It is alleged that no person else can purchase as they have no market for them and there is no competition in the price paid for the animals.—Dresden Times.

Delaware avenue sidewalks are at present agitating the board of works. Owned property beside the sidewalk of the walk has been condemned, are of opinion that it would be better to have the new walk laid on the opposite side of the street. There is a peculiar state of affairs. One side of the avenue has no walk in most of its length and the opposite sidewalk is used by all. It would seem that the frontage by-law should provide for payment by all beneficiaries.

William street bridge approaches have long been in bad condition. The connection with the bridge was very poor and was not without danger to loaded wagons. The same might be said of the bridge over the sewer or a look in the retaining wall. The pavement for about thirty feet should be taken up and relaid higher. The same might with advantage be done at the north approach.

Those who are interested in the study of human nature will be pleased to learn that Prof. W. G. Alexander, representing Fowler and Wells, the leading phrenologists in the world, is booked for a course of lectures here at Northwood's Hall, beginning on Wednesday evening next. Professor Alexander is well and favorably known in this city. His lectures delivered here four years ago attracted a great deal of attention, both from the public and the press, and those who attended them then will be glad of another opportunity of doing so. The success that has attended Professor Alexander has been so remarkable that Fowler and Wells have retained him as their permanent representative in the field.

Returned miners say the food prospects in Dawson City are getting desperate.

Joseph Birch, a C. P. R. engineer at Ottawa, was crushed to death while coupling cars.

Nokki, in British Africa, has really been seized by the French, but there was no fighting.

Germany has ordered eight warships in Chinese waters, and unless China gives way is probable.

The Canadian government has notified Washington that it will not agree to the suspension of pelagic sealing.

The Austrian ministry has resigned and the people have quieted down in the rioting on Saturday several were killed and injured.

Wm. Spice, of West Missouri, a farmer, was killed by a trolley car in London on Saturday.

By a typhoon in the Philippines, which swept over several towns, 6,000 natives and 40 Europeans were drowned.

Myers, of Kingston, has broken the world's road record for fifty miles by 8 minutes. He rode from Belleville to Kingston in 2:07.

The United States has intimated to Germany that she will not tolerate the use of force in the matter of the former's claims against Haiti.

Henry Labouchere got out an injunction to restrain the publication of letters which showed he was manipulating the stock market.

The result of the investigation into the recent C. P. R. wreck at Galt is that an engineer of the company in London has been dismissed.

Two Americans in the Belgian Congo service were killed by natives recently. They slipped one up and out him; the other's heart was cut out and buried.

Attorney-General Fitzgerald, of San Francisco, says they will go ahead and have Durant, after he is sentenced, regardless of any further legal quibbling.

Col. Polk, who alleged that Count Doolittle and not Capt. Dreyfus betrayed the French secrets to Germany, has been sentenced to thirty days imprisonment.

An English company will establish a stage line between Edinburgh and Dawson City. The distance is 1,300 miles and they will cover it in 23 days. They have already bought 600 horses.

Six labor representatives have been elected to the Belfast council, and eight Nationalists. The Conservatives, aided by the priests, defeated all the Dilworths, while ex-Lord Mayor McCannond was defeated by an independent.

Gen. Cassius M. Clay, of Kentucky, the old veteran whose wife has left him and is living with her brother, has sent the brother word that he will kill him if he does not leave the country.

In the Goldenstrasse murder case in New York, Thors testified that Mrs. Nack lured the victim to the scene of the murder and shot and stabbed him to death. Thors said he held the body while Mrs. Nack cut it up. Her reason for killing him was that he knew of her crimes.
