BRYAN TO RUN FOR PRESIDENT

STIRRING ENTHUSIASM **GREETS NOMINATION**

Choice of Nebraskan is Made Unanimous—Stirring Scene at Denver.

Denver, Colo, July 10 .- William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska, was nominated for the third time for the office of president of the United States by the Democratic National convention at 3:40 o'clock this morning, amid scenes of frenzied enthusiasm. The result came after an all-night session which was kept in a constant state of turmoil up till the moment when the Nebraska leader was proclaimed the choice of the

first ballot, the vote standing: Wm. J. Bryan, 8921/2; Judge Geo. Gray, 591/2; Governor Jno. A. Johnson, 46.

The announcement of the vote was the signal for a wild demonstration, qualling in duration the recordbreaking display which on Wednesday afternoon greeted the first mention of Mr. Bryan's name in the convention. The scene within the ampitheatre at the moment of the nomination was one of stirring animation, from pit to dome. The vast building was packed BILL IS INTRODUCED with 10,000 people, thinned out in the remotest galleries after hours of walting through the intense discomforts of hot night. It was a great spectacle of grand proportions. Tier and tier, and gallery upon gallery of animated forms, the women in white, the men below, many of them coatless, myriads of fans fluttering to combat the stifling heat, the long pent up exuberant multi tude was ever ready to spring into feverish outbreaks of enthusiasm, and everywhere the blaze of flags, bunting

and patriotic devices, and the enveloping folds of "Old Glory." Twice before the throng had beer moved into a wild ecstacy, first by the mention of Bryan in nomination and again when that of Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, was presented, but these manifestations paled before the culmination outbursts of emotion as the announcement of the Nebraskan's actual nomination was made. The assemblage rose en masse waving flags, handkerchiefs, newspapers, hats and coats, anything, everything which hands could be laid upon to wave or hurl into the air when a bedlam of sound poured out from those 10,000 throats in exultant yells, cat calls, nmanche war whoops with the added din of shrieking horns, the roar of megaphones, and the strains of the band playing an exultant anthem. When for a moment order could be secured out of this tempest and chaos of stration, state after state which had at first recorded its vote for John-son or Gray fell into line with the overmastering climax and the nomination The taking of the vote had been fol-New York was reached in the call of states, the announcement of Chief Murphy, 78 votes for Bryan, brought out a wild outburst of enthusiasm, which for a time compelled the suspen-

sion of roll call. A further delay was caused by a demand for a poll of the New York delegation. On this poll many of the New York delegates, including Judge Parker, the presidential nominee, four years ago, remained silent, but the entire 78 votes of the delegation were cast for Bryan under the united rules. Montreal, July 10.—A London cable says: Word has just reached London that at the recent South African cenference, the ministers of Cape Colony and the Orange River Colony strongly opposed the retention of the British preference. The Natal ministers made an ineffective response, and preference seemed doomed, when General Botha, who had remained inscrutably dumb, said: "I would never have proposed the preference when it was proposed, when there was no chance of proposed, when there was no chance of British reciprocity, but I am not going to slap the British public in the face now, when they evidently mean to respond." Boy on Verge of Death From Eating Pills From Sample Box.

London, Ont., July 10 .- Three-year-old Eric Nicholson ate half a dozen pills from a sample package thrown in at the door and nearly died as a result. His body lled up to an enormous size, acco panied by fever and delirium. The doctor worked with him for hours, and finally succeeded in saving his life, though he is still very sick.

In this way the profit of the middle man will be cut out and the ranchers will get better profits and the public better prices.

La Paz, July 10.—Further details received here of the revolution in Paraguay state that while fighting was going on in Asuncion an incident occurred which might have had a most serious re-suit. The United States minister, Edward O'Brien, desrous of proffering his good offices in order to prevent further loss of life, while approaching the headquarters of the revolutionists was fired upon three times by government troops. According to the dispatches, the minister's escape was miraculous, as many persons were killed in the vicinity. Discovering their error, the troops ceased firing, and an officer hastened to give explanations to
