The cause of the decrease was that the remuneration for teachers was far too small; and it was every day-getting smaller in proportion to the cost of living. The payment of teachers had not risen in proportion to the cost of living, and to the pay to be had in other occupations for men. The convenuence was that men who would be teachers said: "If you don't reward the teacher properly, we won't come and teach." If people did not come forward to teach, what was to become of the education of this province? It meant thus the people would be content with a lower education than in other countries. He hoped that such action would be taken as would bring the matter to the attention of the public, for public opinion must be educated on that point.

Principal Robins presented his annual report, in which he referred to the inauguration of the school in 1887, and said that during the years that had elapsed since then the institution had contually grown in efficiency. The number of diplomas issued since the commencement was \$3,722, and between 4,000 and 5,000 persons had enjoyed the benefits of attendance at the school. The total number admitted to the institution during the past year was 181 women and two men, making a total of 183.


