

DOMINION HAS GREAT FUTURE SAYS LORD STRATHCONA.

At End of Century Population Will be Twice as Large as That of Great Britain and Ireland Combined---Wishes to be Remembered as Donald Smith--Receives Gift From Curlers.

(Special to the Sun.) MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 11.—Lord Strathcona left this evening for New York, whence he will sail on the Carmania for England. This afternoon his lordship officiated at the formal opening of the St. Lawrence Curling Club's new rink. He was presented with an address and also with an ornate curling stone with a gold handle and with a handsome curling broom. In a brief reply Lord Strathcona said that he was especially interested in curling, because it was Scotland's national game. He wished that he could be free to join in active participation with them, but he was afraid that at the present he would be a very lame curler. Lord Strathcona spoke optimistically of the future of the dominion, which he said would be greater than any one at present anticipated. At the end of the present century he estimated that Canada would have a population twice as large as the combined populations of Great Britain and Ireland. The natural conditions of the country could hardly be improved upon. We had a greater territory than the republic to the south and a climate that was equally good. Satisfactory it was to know that the growth of Canada in the past and present was not the result of a boom, but due entirely to natural conditions. He trusted that whatever her prosperity Canada would ever remain an integral part of the great empire to which she now gave her allegiance. In conclusion his lordship said that while he was proud of the title by which he had been honored by the late lamented Queen Victoria, he would rather be remembered by his friends in Montreal as Donald Smith. It was the name by which he had been known to them in other days, and he would be loath to change the relations which had existed between them then.


ST. STEPHEN 5-4.

LIQUOR INVESTIGATION

AT BATHURST, N. B.

Postponed Session Held Yesterday—Considerable Interest in the Proceedings.

(Special to the Sun.) BATHURST, Jan. 11.—The county council being in session, Hon. W. P. Jones, commissioner to examine into the charges against the liquor license commissioners, and the inspector of the county held the adjourned session today at the office in the court house of John E. O'Brien, the parish court commissioner. Among those present besides the counsel and witnesses were Rev. J. Hugh Hooper, Rev. Fathers Allard, Martin and Rev. Mr. Ople, some of the clergy who are backing the charges. The commissioner Stewart, chairman of the board, and Inspector Cowan were present. The evidence given today covering the testimony of some ten witnesses confirmed that already given as to the continued and open selling of liquor by retail in two places, one in the town and one in the village of Bathurst which hold wholesale licenses. Some important evidence was also given as to the practice of card playing for profit on licensed premises in the town and one in the village of Bathurst. A session of the commission is being held this evening. Before adjournment at six o'clock Mr. Gilbert announced that he hoped to be able to finish his case tonight. Mr. Most and Mr. Harrington will then state whether or not they will be prepared to open up for the defense at once or will ask for an adjournment.

It is announced that as a result of representations made at the forestry congress the dominion government will introduce legislation next session to reserve all the timber lands under control of federal authorities for public domain, except what is required for settlement. In case of timber for settlers there will be certain restrictions as to cutting, so that the forest wealth of the dominion may be preserved. The dominion only owns timber lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, unorganized territories, Yukon and part of British Columbia. In the older provinces timber lands are owned by provinces.

FRANCES ORR ON TRIAL IN HAMPTON

Evidence Wednesday Revealed Shocking Conditions. If the Child Had Been Properly Cared For It Would Have Lived—The Mother Had Little Attention.

HAMPTON, Kings Co., Jan. 9.—The January term of the Supreme Court for Kings county opened this morning at 11 o'clock. Mr. Justice Landry on the bench. The only criminal case is that of Frances Orr, who was sent up yesterday by stipendiary magistrate Morison of Sussex charged with the manslaughter of her infant child. She was brought to the goal here last evening, at which time the evidence taken in the preliminary examination was placed in the hands of the judge. Ketchum, Charles D. Prince, William Ballentine, Henry S. Parlee and Myles H. Fowler. Dr. J. J. Daley was chosen foreman of the grand jury. His honor in charging the grand jury reviewed the case of Frances Orr, on the four counts of the indictment, and explained the nature of manslaughter and its varying degrees. He thanked the grand jury for their attendance in full, referred to their services being rendered cheerfully and without remuneration and called their attention to the absence in the court house of one of the richest and most flourishing counties in the province of those sanitary arrangements and common means of comfort found in these days in every school house and almost every home. It was the duty of the municipal council to see that everything needed to equip the building properly with heating and sanitary arrangements equal to those of other counties should be supplied without further delay. The grand jury retired to consider the Orr case. The docket in addition to the criminal cases, included the following: James Buchanan vs. Jane and James Armstrong, White and King for plaintiff. Abram B. Crawford vs. Eara Crawford, White and King for plaintiff. These are jury cases.

CHATHAM JEWELRY STORE ROBBED

Burglar Entered Premises of W. R. Gould—Goods Were Recovered.

CHATHAM, N. B., Jan. 11.—The jewelry store of W. R. Gould was robbed last night. Entrance was obtained by breaking a pane of glass and unlocking the back door. The safe not having been locked, the burglar had an easy job, as all the valuable stock was at his mercy. When Dennis Gould, who is managing the store during the temporary absence of his father, went into the back store this morning he found the safe open and the goods being intact. Suspicion rested upon an individual who had been about the premises during the day, and an intermediary conveyed a message to him with a view to restitution of the stolen property. This evening the following goods were handed over to the police: viz., one diamond ring, five gentlemen's set rings, three guards, one bracelet, two lockets, three charms, which comprised the booty in the way of goods at hand at Port Lawrence. Besides these articles \$15 in cash was also stolen, the thief promising to make restitution of this in a few days. It is expected that Mr. Gould will be able to enter an information in the police court and bring the burglar to justice.

MOROCCAN SITUATION; HISTORY OF TROUBLE.

Empire Has Been in State of Turmoil For Many Years Past—An Absolute Depotism—Many Pretenders to the Throne Wage Steady Warfare.

The Empire of Morocco, an absolute depotism, has been in a state of turmoil for many years past, owing to the narrow course of events in a country unrestricted by any laws, civil or religious, and also on account of the steady warfare which the Sultan, Mulai Abd-el-Asiz, has had to wage against the pretenders to the throne. This caused a feeling of uneasiness among the Arab tribes in Algeria, the adjoining French territory, and led to efforts on the part of France to assume a guardianship over Morocco. Germany was not willing to unreservedly agree to this, being second only to Great Britain in the extent of her interests in Morocco. In 1902 the imports of the three powers into Morocco were: Great Britain, \$1,210,000; Germany, \$1,550,000, and France, \$380,000. The exports of Morocco to the three powers in 1902, were: To Great Britain, \$2,000,000; to Germany, \$550,000, and to France \$785,000. France, pursuing her Moroccan policy, sent a special mission to Fez last year. Germany and Great Britain did the same. The German Emperor went to Fez in person, accompanied by his wife, on March 31, 1905, on the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, but remained ashore barely two hours. During that time he made a speech of which several versions were published. The substance of his majesty's remarks, however, was that he assured the German residents that the sovereignty and integrity of Morocco would be maintained. The same day the then French minister of foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, made a significant speech in the senate at Paris, during which after referring to the Sultan's weakness and the anarchy resulting therefrom, "prejudicial to everybody and especially to France, and Algeria," he declared that "a resolute intervention in interested quarters would not cause France to modify her policy" in Morocco. This sentiment called forth vigorous applause.

FOUND NOT GUILTY THEN MARRIED

Frances Orr Weds Young Norman Goddard.

His Honor reviewed the evidence and the jury retired at 12 o'clock, returning into court at 12.30 with a unanimous verdict of "Not Guilty." The prisoner was at once discharged. This afternoon the court was occupied with a jury case, Buchanan v. Armstrong, in which James Buchanan of Sussex, sues his sister, Mrs. James Armstrong, for trespass. White and King for the plaintiff, and McDowell, Jonah and Parlee for the defendant. A narrow strip land near Apohaqui is involved, but it is being fought over with considerable tenacity and expert witnesses. Gilbert Murdoch and Peter Campbell, surveyors, being among them. The evidence of Mr. Buchanan was partially taken and he was stood aside to enable Gilbert Murdoch to go on the stand. His cross-examination was in progress when the court adjourned till tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

Jury Unanimous in Their Verdict—Couple Left For Their Home in Sussex.

HAMPTON, Jan. 11.—The Frances Orr incident has ended with a bit of romance that has given to her "a happy issue out of all her troubles." Shortly after she had been cleared by the jury, the unanimous verdict of the jury for whom she was tried on the charge preferred against her, R. T. Ballantine, Isaac Campbell and others, interested themselves in the girl's welfare, and finding that Norman Goddard, a young man for some time past was anxious to be in a legal position to look after and care for her, the consent of Grandmother Orr was obtained, as well as that of the girl herself, to an immediate marriage ceremony. Mrs. Isaac Campbell very kindly placed her parlor at the disposal of the parties concerned and the license having been secured and the Rev. G. F. Eaton summoned, the couple were speedily joined in the holy bonds of wedlock in the presence of a distinguished company of local gentlemen and prominent residents who extended their cordial good wishes to the young people. They left for their home by the Sussex express.
