Beattie and McPherson were appointed a committee to assist in establishing a mission at Louisburg. These Bro. McDonald gave us a profitable address on the duty of the church to the Sunday school. Bro. G. P. Raymond, pastor from New Glasgow, was present and was invited to a seat and rendered us valuable assistance. The afternoon meeting was devoted to a paper by Bro.
