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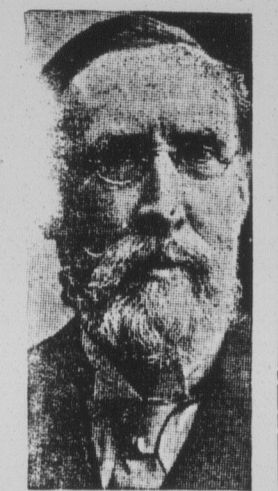

Moncton, N. B., Jan. 4th. — The year that has just closed has been one beset with trials and difficulties not only for the Maritime Provinces but for the rest of Canada and the whole world. We entered the year with the legacy of adverse conditions

and that great factor in international affairs took on immense proportions, namely, world trade. Production was speeded up and later improvements in prime-movers and machinery, particularly in their application to industry, has further complicated the situation, so that today, we have the problem on our hands of so adjusting the factors of mechanized production on one hand and employment on the other that mankind can advance.

In the agricultural field transportation has opened up increased areas for the production of foodstuffs, thereby adding to the area under cultivation with the result that we have enormous crops which are harvested with a minimum of manual labor. As an example of this, the present period might be compared with that a few years back. Not so very long ago large numbers of harvesters from the eastern provinces were wont to go to the western wheatfields in the Fall of the year on the harvest excursions. They earned considerable money and incidentally brought some passenger revenue to the railways in the handling. Most of the money they earned was brought back and spent in the territory from which they originated. With the advent of the combine machine, this annual movement was largely terminated with the result that this part of the East lost this additional earning power and the railways lost the revenue.

The present economic conditions have been laid at the door of various agencies, among others, the war, mechanization of labor and Russia. Again it has been blamed on excessive speculation in the stock market and on the rather darkened horizon, we have the contention with us and the best minds of the world are engaged in finding a solution. What that solution will be I am not prepared to state. Doubtless at some future date the real cause or causes will be sifted out of the bewildering array of evidence but the problem is a huge one involving the cooling of the steam engine and its growing motion in the rice fields of China, the Arab in the desert, the peasant of Europe and our own people.

In looking for some ray of sunshine in the rather darkened horizon, there have been glimmerings here and there that the dawn of a better day is approaching. Humanity must go on and it is unthinkable that the onward march of progress can be stayed or turned back after such remarkable achievements to date. In the field of governmental

science we have advanced from a state of barbarism to representative parliaments; in the field of medicine disease is being banished from our midst and pain and suffering conquered; in the realms of transportation and communication we have practically annihilated distance, bringing the outlying parts of the country and the nations of the world close together. There is no stagnation in these fields of human endeavor and it would seem that the cure for our present ills lies in the re-establishment of international credits so that the business of the world may go on.

Coming down to the Maritime Provinces it must be admitted that we have fared fairly well. We have, comparatively speaking, held our own stability. The prospects for 1932 are full of hope. Our statesmen and experts have been brought face to face with the realities of the existing situation and they will doubtless find some solution which will once more keep the wheels of industry turning smoothly to the benefit of the whole human race. In the present unsatisfactory world state lies the germ of greater understanding and co-operation between the nations of the world and this in turn will benefit every community.

We in the Maritimes can look forward to 1932 with confidence. Our natural resources are immense and increasing in value as research funds are used for them. The people of the world will still go on living and consuming eatables and clothing and the average man will aspire to securing those ordinary comforts of life which, after all, is the great driving force behind all human progress. New channels of trade will be opened up and out of all the welter we believe will evolve a greater prosperity and a more stable economic system.

Canadian Gifts To World Progress Have Been Noteable

Ottawa, Jan. 5th. (Special to "Le Madawaska") — A compilation has been made by a Canadian newspaper of some of the contributions to world progress made by the Dominion in comparatively recent years and the following are noted.

Canada built and demonstrated the first railway sleeping car. Built and sent the steamboat across the Atlantic.

Gave to the world the idea of the all-electric radio. Originated the idea of making power from pulpwood. First isolated helium gas in commercial quantities.

Originated the idea of the panorama camera. Originated the idea of electric heating. Built the world's first electric stove.

Originated Marquis and other more recent wheats, which helped build up the commerce of the West, both in Canada and the United States.

The idea of the telephone originated in Canada, and the first long-distance trials of the instruments were made in Ontario between Paris

Ont., and Brantford. Canada pioneered in the field of electro-chemistry with the discovery of calcium carbide by Tom Wilson of Hamilton.

Canada originated the idea of standard time, which has since been adopted in every civilized country in the world. Canada built and demonstrated the first submarine telegraph in the history of the world.

A Canadian physician, discovered insulin, a serum for the treatment of diabetes. Canada built and demonstrated the first compound steam engine in the history of the world. The effect of this invention was the doom of the sailing ship as a factor in ocean commerce.
