NEW BRUNSWICK MAKE \$5,000,000

LOAN THIS MONTH

Have Charge of Arrangements.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 4. — The Province of New Brunswick will in a few days offer a Bond Issue of Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000) according to announcement made this afternoon by Hon. C. D. Richards, Premier.

In making this and In making this announcement Premier Richards stated the issue would be a domestic loan, payable in Canada only. The negociations for this loan have been underway for some time now with the Bank of Montreal and associates in the city of Montreal and the final arrangements are now about completed, he said.

A formal announcement will be made in a day or two, Premier Richards declared, giving full particulars, with terms and conditions of the loan.
