CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS INCREASED SERVICE

Transcontinental Train Every Day in the Week

Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver-Victoria. In effect October 5th.

A daily Transcontinental service between Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver-Victoria, is the principal feature announced in the Canadian National Railway Fall and Winter time table.

This train will leave Toronto 9:15 p.m. daily and will be equipped with up-to-date sleeping, dining, first-class day coach, tourist and colonist cars. Between Toronto and Winnipeg there will also be a compartment-observation library car.

A parlor car will be attached, for the convenience of passengers, while travelling through the Rockies, so they may enjoy, in the utmost comfort, the magnificent scenery for which the Canadian National route is famous.

Visited His Old Parish on Sunday

Captain Rev. Thomas Harrison Preached to a Large Congregation at St. George.—Subject "The City Beautiful."

Capt. Harrison visited his old congregation at St. George and had a packed church on Sunday. His theme, "The City Beautiful," was taken from 21st Chapter of Revelations, "And the doors of the city shall not be shut by day; and there will be no night there." There is no reason, according to the text, said the Captain in his own quaint way, if the doors are not shut by day, and there is no night there, that the city has its genesis in God. More clear God was revealed to man. Along with it grew the conception of the City Beautiful. That was purely a dream, a vision and noble conception of God by Abraham, a gray father standing in the dim dawn of the world. Elahaddie, the "God who is," or the "I am," was the world as we see it. Imagine one conceiving God that is not content with cities in which sin and wrong abounded. He lived in a world where the world was young; mighty empires were in the distant future. He heard the divine voice calling him to go forth and build a city a simpler and purer faith. Many difficulties beset his path; he met in the way opposition to daunt the strongest, but he had caught the vision glorious and he went forth seeking a city which had foundations, whose builder and maker was God.

The man Moses was sustained by the same vision. More splendidly still God revealed Himself to him. "God said, 'I will be with thee.' With this conception and vision of the city, he became a splendid patriot. He forsook Egypt and found his vocation. Patriotism has made many a man sublime, lifted him out of a cold selfhood into a magnanimity that rejoiced to live or die for the freedom of men.

This vision upheld Moses for forty years with a stiff-necked people, and in the end he saw the city. The aged John, in an age unlike these, but with the Christ conception of God (Father), was sustained in his loneliness by the conception and vision of the city. "The New Jerusalem coming down from God out of Heaven among men."

I said the Captain, knew a city. I have stood in its streets long years ago, watching its busy scenes. Outside of the city was a hill, venerable and respected. I have climbed to its summit. How small men looked below, but above the clouds one caught the vision. Away over the waters stood the grey hills of Scotland; turning round and looking over sweet County Down were the Mourne Mountains, pushing their tops to the sky; down near the city was the splendid loch; the vision was rapturous.

Along the lane of history there have been mountains to which men could ascend and catch here and there a view of the City Beautiful. I called upon our young men here in 1914 to give and defend the city. Thank God, they did. Some have paid the supreme sacrifice.
