

India Leaders of Nationalist Party Heavily Sentenced

Were Found Guilty of Attempting to Form Congress of Volunteer Corps.

Allahabad, British India, Dec. 9.—The trial of a number of prominent nationalist leaders today, who were arrested Wednesday in connection with their attempt to form a Congress of the Provincial Volunteers' Corps, which the government had declared illegal, resulted in a sentence of six months' imprisonment being imposed upon Pandit Motilal Nehru, the alleged ring leader. He was also fined 600 rupees. Chairman of the Municipal Board, London, was sentenced to eight months' imprisonment, with a fine of 250 rupees; and six months' imprisonment with a fine of 100 rupees, was imposed on several others.
