Decision in Moncton Scott Act Cases. Brings Resolution from Kent-Northumberland S. of T. in Annual Meeting. Harcourt, Aug. 8-(Special)-The fifth meeting of Kent-Northumberland District Division S. of T. took place at Newcastle yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. District worthy Patriarch Thomas A. Clarke in the chair. Representatives present were: A. Clarke, D. W. P. J. Falconer, D. Chap. Edward McGraw, Mrs. H. Ingram, Miss Addie M. Bockler, and Mrs. W. H. Stuart, D. S.; Ernest E. Another Statement by the New Brunswick Telephone Company. The following explanation and statement of the president of the company with regard to the cutting off of the connection between Newcastle and Chatham: "Mr. Blair, when in Fredericton Tuesday, was put in possession of what had occurred, particularly at Newcastle and Chatham, and the feeling that seemed to be aroused in that locality because of the disconnection, which had heretofore been able to have free telephone exchange between them, by reason of an order which had been given by the assistant general manager prevented from enjoying that privilege."

Provincial Educational Matters. At the board of education meeting yesterday afternoon at 7 o'clock, the report of the committee on the state of the order, which was reported as follows: "We are pleased with the increase in the interest and membership in the Kent county, but regret that the membership is not larger; and when we take away the increase of 48 in Bass River Division, we find that the number of members in Kent county is 438, had 60; Bass River, No. 41, had 102; Newcastle, No. 43, had 55; Richmond, No. 42, had 47; Miramichi, No. 34, had 34; and Caledonia, No. 128, of Douglasston, about 50, total for the seven divisions 574, an increase of 60 members in three months since the meeting of the board of education in Fredericton. The good of the order was discussed by T. A. Clarke, Mrs. Anderson, H. H. Stuart, Jas. Falconer and others. Mr. Clarke spoke especially of the prospects of finally suppressing illegal liquor selling in Newcastle. It was decided that it was in the best interests of both counties that Kent and Northumberland remain united in one district division. The next meeting will be held in Harcourt in January. On motion of E. H. Buckerfield and G. A. J. J. Falconer, it was resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent him."
