

# WEDNESDAY TRAINS

### Will Begin Service June 22

### C. P. R. to Montreal, Ocean Limited and Boston Night to Run Daily Each Way to Halifax - Two From Halifax Each Morning and One Evening During Summer Months.

Truro, N. S., June 18.—Next Monday will see put into effect the summer timetable of the Intercolonial Railway. The new features are emphasized by the intended running of three important express trains every day out of and into Halifax, where hitherto only one run on Sundays.

A train to be composed of Canadian Pacific Railway cars and coaches will leave Halifax at 8 o'clock every morning going through the magnificent coast via St. John. This train will be known as No. 15.

The Ocean Limited, which has hitherto been doing a winter service to Moncton, will leave the city twenty minutes later and keep an even distance along to Truro, Amherst and Moncton, doing this every day.

The night express, known here as the Boston train, will leave Halifax also every day. Coupled up with this train, which is known as No. 9, there will be through cars for Sydney every night except Sunday.

## SCIENCE TO STOP GROWTH OF BOY, 15, NOW 6 FEET 7

### Still Growing Rapidly Surgeons Will Remove Gland Which Controls Physical Development.

Philadelphia, June 16.—In the hope that he can be saved from the fate of becoming a physical giant and a mental prodigy, John Michael, fifteen years old, who is six feet seven inches in height and still growing rapidly, soon will undergo an unprecedented operation at the Medical-Chirurgical Hospital here, as surgeons prepare to remove from the base of the brain a portion of the pituitary gland, which controls bodily growth. Unless that checks his physical development they assert, the great overgrowth of his body will affect his mind, and he will become virtually helpless, although a Goliath in stature and strength.

The boy's rapid growth to such immense proportions has been a source of much annoyance and discomfort. His schoolmates are unable to follow him like a man among dwarfs, ridiculed him on account of his great size. In public also his stature attracted so much attention that he had to go out. His father had to have an extra large bed made for him and at the hospital it was necessary to provide an exceptionally large chair for him and a special bedstead of the usual coverings.

The operation, which the surgeons say, never has been performed on a human child, is being done by Dr. J. H. Draper, who is Professor Judson Dalzell of the hospital staff, returns from Europe. The fact that operations on the pituitary gland check physical growth in such cases was discovered through experiments performed recently on dogs by surgeons at the University of Pennsylvania. The boy's father, who is facing trial on charges of extreme and unnecessary cruelty in his experiments.
