STRONG TEAM OF INTERMEDIATES

Stratford will have a strong intermediate hockey team this season under the direct management of the Grand Trunk Athletic Association, although the O. H. A. games will be played under the colors and auspices of the Stratford Hockey Club, as that club holds the O. H. A. franchise. The G. T. A. A. appointed Ernie Clarke and W. Housell as their two representatives on the hockey club executive to look after the interests of the intermediates.

This much was decided at a meeting of the players. It is expected that enough players will turn out to make up two teams and exhibition games will be arranged with outside teams in order that everybody may get into the game.

William McArdle, who managed the intermediates last year and the juniors for a couple of years before that was picked to handle the players again this season and Sid Faulkner will be trainer.

The intermediates will be entirely separate from the juniors, the only common point being that the Stratford Hockey Club will have to handle the finances of both teams under the O. H. A. ruling. They will have practice three nights a week at the run starting to-night.

HEAL AND MAUPOME WIN.

Hugh Heal, of Toledo, and Byron Gillette, of Buffalo, met in the first championship tournament at Cleveland, Heal winning 50 to 26, in 69 innings.

Pierre Maupome, of Milwaukee, won from Jess Lean, of Cincinnati, 50 to 42, in 79 innings in the second game of today's card.

THREE CUSHION BILLIARD RECORDS.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 15.—Two world records at three-cushion billiards were broken here to-day by Tim Denton, of Kansas City. Denton scored 50 points in 30 innings in his match with Byron Gillette, of Buffalo, in the three-cushion billiard tournament, breaking the previous record of 35 innings. Gillette scored 23 points.

Denton also broke the world's high run record for match or tournament games by scoring 17 points in the 14th inning. The previous record was 14 in one inning. Denton's run was with Pierre Maupome, in an exhibition game.

The Guelph Collegiate Institute defeated Sarnia Collegiate here Saturday afternoon in the first of the home-and-home games in the O. R. F. U. semi-finals, by a score of 13 to 11, and will, therefore, go to Sarnia next Saturday with only a two-point lead. The game was played in ideal football weather before a large crowd and was a hard fought struggle all the way, with the result in doubt until the final whistle.

Sarnia's football team estimated Petrolia from the intermediate O. R. F. U. series at London on Saturday afternoon by 19 to 2, and will now meet Dundas in the semi-finals. It was the third game in eight days for the Imperial City 14, necessitated by their loss a week ago to Petrolia in the latter town. Sarnia won from London in the play-off in Petrolia on Wednesday by 15 to 9, and then became victors over Petrolia for the district.

TESTING SEEDS FOR FARMERS AND MERCHANTS

The Dominion Seed Branch with laboratories at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary reported over 35,000 seed tests for the year ending June 30th. The growth of seed testing in Canada is indicated from the fact that only 5,775 samples were reported in 1909. The great bulk of the work in our seed laboratories is done between September and June when each laboratory may handle up to 200 samples per day. Only ten samples are tested free of charge for any farmer or seed merchant during the season. Over this number, the service is charged for at cost.

Official seed testing is the basis of Government seed control, which in older European countries is rated as a leading Government service. Any country without an efficient system of seed control soon becomes the dumping ground for inferior seeds from other countries, and low-grade homegrown seeds may be sold to unsuspecting farmers. Our system is frequently referred to in other countries as being the most practical and efficient.

Its importance is now being better appreciated when it is required that imported seeds are not released from bond until they are approved at the seed laboratories, and when cereal grains, flax, corn, as well as clover and grass seeds, are marketed on the basis of fixed quality seed grade standards.

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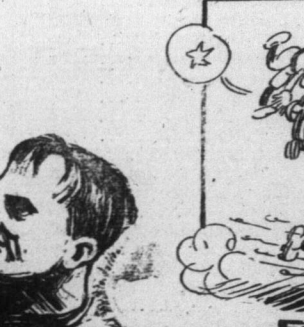

PREMIER DRURY IN FA GREAT ELECTOR

Proportional Representation Will End Party
Electors Chance to Vote in Order of 1

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—The relegation to history in Ontario of party government—no less a vision holds a place in the mind of Premier F. C. Drury and no less a purpose will actualize some of the activities of the Drury government according to a statement by Premier Drury.

"Will the voters of Ontario at the next election be called upon to vote under the proportional representation system?" The Premier smiled, obviously debating whether any pronouncement on the subject would be premature. Then he said: "I should say that it is altogether probable that at the next Ontario Elections the present system will be superseded by the one you have mentioned. There is most certainly room for this electoral reform in this province. No reasonable man in my opinion would oppose such a move."

"Why should there be a government and an opposition what is the necessity of such a system as that of party government? Proportional representation would ensure some measure of representation to the minorities of the province and who can reasonably object to that? It is not the ideal form of government. It is but a modification of the party form of administration but there seems to be justification for further progress towards parties."

ELMIRA-HAMILTON RAIL BY-LAW GIVEN FIRS

Finance Committee Will Consider Details of
pointing City Solicitor and Fixing Salary

PETITION FOR VOTE ON WATER

The first reading was given the Elmira-Hamilton railway bill by the City Council last evening. A special meeting of the Finance Committee will be held to consider the by-law in detail and to make a recommendation on its merits to the Council. It is the intention of the Hydro Commission acting for the municipalities to have the by-law submitted at the election at New Year's.

The city is asked to guarantee its proportionate share of the bonds to be issued to cover the cost of the road. Its share will be \$1,053,080. The period of the bonds and guarantee will be forty years. The cost of the road will be \$6,530,650.

The by-law is framed along lines similar to that of the proposed Toronto-London railway which the city passed several years ago. The bonds for this railway were, according to the by-law, to be deposited at Toronto, but the city has never been called upon to deposit them.

The first reading was given on the motion of Aldermen Zettel and Assen and was unanimous. Mayor Gross and several of the aldermen alluded to the advisability of considering the by-law at a Finance Committee meeting. The mayor added that he believed the great majority of the people would support the by-law, which would provide something for the public good. "However there is one clause in it which I think should be carefully considered. As it stands, it would take all power away from the city and give it all over to the Commission which could do as it liked. I think this should be considered before we finally pass on it."

A petition of ratepayers asks for a vote on the question of the abolition of the Water Commission. It asks that the vote be taken at New Year's. The Council also referred this to the Finance Committee.

This Petition Also to Finance The petition from several hundred ratepayers to have another plebiscite on the name of the city as between the present and former name, the vote of the ratepayers to be held at New Year's was also referred to the Finance Committee on the suggestion of the mayor.

City Solicitor and Duties Change of the Finance report was struck out on the motion of Aldermen Assen and Reid, the matter being referred back to the Committee. This clause recommended the appointment of Mr. H. J. Sims to the office of city solicitor at a salary of \$1500.
