

Baldwin dies

Reporter Scoop 'Nute and Snoot' Killgallin

EDMONTON (DP) - Edmonton police have detained a University of Alberta student as a suspect in the bizarre ritual murder of Dean Baldwin in his home last night.

From what details are available, *Getaway* has learned that Dean Baldwin was garrotted about midnight last night with an old gym sock left unclaimed from last year's Pandas basketball team. Furnishing and objets d'art were smashed and scattered throughout the living room, the scene of the murder. In a statement exclusive to *Getaway*, Mrs. Baldwin, wife of the deceased, declared, "Good God! I'll never get this place clean again." Satanic symbols, black magic inscriptions and the A.I.B. logo

were carved in all the walls and the ceiling. Across one of the walls, "Engineers rule the world," was scrawled crazily in blood. This was not the work of a sane mind.

CKSR goes national

Students' Union Executive Services Vice-president Jan Grude announced this morning that the Student Radio Station, CKSR, will become a national radio network, debuting February 1, 1977.

"CKSR received its license from the CRTC last month, and the CKSR staff is now preparing for the big day," Grude said. "The expansion of the station won't mean too much more expenditures from the Students' Union, however," Grude added, "As most of the increased cost will be covered by advertising."

CKSR Chief Engineer, Ed Wagers has been placed in charge of supervising the changeover.

"We'll be needing the entire second floor of SUB for our space, production studios, and our record library," commented Wagers. "In order to broadcast from coast to coast twenty-four hours a day, we'll need a lot more room and more administration."

CKSR will focus primarily on British folk music of the eighteenth century. "About 80% of our content will be British folk," said Harvey King, CKSR librarian. "The other 20% will consist mainly of progressive jazz and ethnic music."
