JONES, DAVID FORD. (South Leeds.)

Of Welsh descent. Family came to America 1645. S. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Jones, Toronto, and grandson of Ephraim Jones, E.q., U.E. Loyalist, both of whom at different periods represented the Co. of Leeds in the U.C. Assembly. B. at Brockville, Ont. Ed. at Upper Canada College. M. Rebecca Ogden, dau of Wm. Roebuck, Esq., and niece of the late John Arthur Roebuck. Esq., M.P. for Sheffield in the British House of Commons. An extensive manufacturer. Has been Warden of Leeds and Grenville. Held the commission of Ensign in the "Queen's Rangers," an incorporated battalion commanded by Col. Saml. P. Jarvis, serving during the Rebellion of 1837 and 1838, and resigning his commission in 1839. In 1862, during the Trent difficulty, organized a Co. of Artillery, the "Gananoque Field Battery," which Co. he commanded for several years, serving during the Fenian Raids, retiring with rank of Major in 1869. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1863. Sat for South Leeds in that House from Jan. 1864 until the Union. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—Gananoque, Ont. ; Rideau Club.

KAULBACH, CHARLES EDWIN. (Lunenburg.)

Of German descent. S. of Lieut. Col. J. H. Kaulbach, High Sheriff of Lunenburg, N.S. Grandson of Henry Kaulbach, Esq., who was High Sheriff of the same Co. for an extended period. Brother of Senator Kaulbach and Rev. J.A. Kaulbach, of Truro, N.S. B. at Lunenburg, 1834. Ed. there. Unmarried. Captain and Adjutant of Militia, and for several years commander of Volunteer Rifle Company in his native town. Large ship and landed estate owner. Performed the duties of High Sheriff in his native county for several years. Was a delegate to the Provincial Synod in Montreal in 1876; to the Diocesan Synod in Halifax in the interest of the Episcopal Church in 1870-72 and 1876. At present Vice-President of Nova Scotian Society for the prevention
