YOU ARE WHAT YOU EAT

In May of 1969 the Research Foundation conducted an analysis of illicit drugs being circulated in the Toronto area.

"The intent of the survey was to monitor the drugs being sold in the street in order to determine their chemical composition and consequent risks to users." Listed below are some of the drugs analysed

and the results. Lysergic Acid Diethalimide (LSD)

Of fourteen samples of material purported to be LSD four were thought to contain constituents such as cocaine, strychine or STP, none did. "Eleven of the fourteen samples were probably produced in clandestine laboratories. Five contained little or no LSD but materials which appeared to be ergot alkaloids. The remainder contained some LSD together with contaminants resulting from incompatible symthesis and/or poor purification." Mescaline

Three samples; none were mescaline. One was LSD and what appeared to be ergot alkaloids. At the time, the composition of the other two were not determined.

MDA (Methylenedyoxyamphetamine)

Seven samples, probably only two contained MDA. One was a powdered sugar, one was dexedrine, one was a mixture of five substances and two were still unidentified at the

Methedrine (Speed)

Ten samples; three contained methedrine plus contaminants resulting from purification; one was in liquid form, the solvent suspected of being wine; two were dexedrine with contaminants; one was probably MDA, three were relatively pure methedrine.

Cannibus (Marijuana) Thirty samples; two were innocuous plant materials such as parsley, mint and bay leaf; twenty-eight were cannibus, of these twenty-two were marijuana and six were hashish; eight samples were thought to contain additional constituents such as heroin, cocaine, opium or amphetamine. None of these

substances were found. Three samples did contain some as yet unidentified substances not normally found in cannibus.
