
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## Holloway quits race for Liberal banner

Peg Holloway who "did not want a contested nomination" has withdrawn as a Liberal candidate in the Feb. 18 federal election.

Holloway surprised many supporters and opponents last week by withdrawing from the five way race for the nomination. Holloway said she could better express her strong viewpoints on Canadian nationalism as a private citizen.

Holloway said that while she had the support of those she "really cared about" on the riding association's executive, "I felt I should have had the full support of the executive." She said the lack of support was a "bitter disappointment" after the effort she put into the last campaign, which she lost by 8,000 votes. "People get the politicians they deserve," she remarked, renewing her criticism of the press for what she termed "biased, negative reporting."

Paul Szabo, the 31-year-old chartered accountant who founded the East Huron Park Homeowners' Association, appears to be the frontrunner for the nomination. He says he has strong support from the executive.

John Brooks, a 27-year-old veteran of Liberal party politics, also says he has strong support from the executive.

Dorian Brisbois, a 31-year-old sales and marketing executive and long-time party supporter, is also running.

The fourth declared candidate is 30year-old Michael Houlton Charette, who has mounted his own buy Carladian campaign for businessmen.

Colin Baynes, who ran for the New Democratic Party last May, has decided not to run again.

One of those considering seeking the nomination on Jan. 9 is Ettore Cardarelli, a two-time municipal council candidate. The vice-chairman of the Peel Multicultural Council is considering several options, including nominations in ridings outside Mississauga and the Liberal nomination in Mississauga North. Don Stirling, the Applewood United

Church Minister challenging Tory-inclimbent MP Don Blenkarn at the Jan. 10 nomination, says he is signing up a number of new members of the riding association.

## North nominations Monday

The three major political parties in the Mississauga North riding will hold meetings to decide their candidates in the Feb. 18 federal election Monday night.

The Progressive Conservative nomination will probably be a formality as incumbent Alex Jupp has decided to run Contesting the NDP nomination are 1979 candidate John McGuigan, a 48-

year-old music teacher, and retired school principal George Ross, 64, former Peel South NDP president. Former Ontario NDP leader Stephen

Former Ontario NDP leader Stephen Lewis will be guest speaker at the meeting in the Russell Langmaid School auditorium at 8 p.m. on Jan. 7.

Most interest to date has been in the Liberals' arena. A stormy executive meeting with possible candidates Peter Cummings and Doug Fisher resulted in

Cummings' withdrawal, although a spokesman said he was certain to have gained the support of the executive.

Officially, Cummings decided against contesting the nomination for family reasons.

Former MP Hyl Chappell said Friday it is a "possibility" he will contest the Liberal nomination.

Steve Mahoney, Ward 8 city councillor, said Sunday he was considering running for the Liberal nomination in Mississauga North.

Al Larochelle, a Malton customs broker, withdrew his candidacy Thursday, but changed his mind Friday morning, saying he had been urged by supporters to press on.

Pat Donahue will also contest the nomination.

The meeting, originally slated for Jan. 14, will be held Jan. 7 at 8 p.m. at Glenforest Secondary School.
