> Re: Timber Licence No. 266, Chemainus I. R. #13.

I regret not having given you all the information, asked for, in my last letter regarding the above.

The quantity of timber taken out in 1947 amounted to 1,467,471 f.b.m., for which we received the sum of 34,433.70.

The matter of discussing the deletion of the Clause re fuel supplies to the Indians was gone into prior to the time the Company decided to move their mill off the Reserve and, while the Indians felt that the Company should be made to stay with their agreement, it was explained that the fuel wood was not much use anyway, as it was simply thin slabs, in long lengths of 12' to 20', and unsuitable for fuel, unless cut into proper lengths.

I wrote the Company on February 18th, as per copy of letter attached -- reply to which you have already received, attached to my last letter.

In view of the fact that the Company does not wish to keep the Mill on the Reserve from now on, I presume that the special conditions listed under Clause 4 will be automatically cancelled as well as the one on the 3rd page, authorizing operation of a Mill on the Reserve. The real reason for Clause 4 being inserted was so that the Indians might avail themselves of cheap fuel wood at the Mill site but, unfortunately, the Company worded their offer poorly, I think, in their letter of May 19, 1947, when they tried to infer that the Indians, as far as Manaimo, could get their fuel at the Mill. I know this was the intention of the Company as their representatives discussed it with me prior to the time they gave their offer, in writing, and no one was more surprised than I to find the Company officials offer to haul the fuel to their homes.
