LETTER FROM SIR JEFFREY AMHERST TO GENERAL HALDIMAND.

NEW YORK, 1st November, 1762.

DEAR SIR,—I have been twenty times at the point of writing to you on a subject which, though of no consequence, I should be glad to know, the exact transactions that passed. When I made a report of Canada to the Secretary of State, Ist transmitted a copy of the part of the map where the limits between Canada and Louisiana were marked, which you delivered to me, and which I acquainted the Secretary of State were done by Monsieur de Vaudreuil. Whether by him, or done in his presence by his direction, comes to the same thing, and the thing itself is of no sort of consequence, as the letter and orders he (Monsieur de Vandreuil) sent to the officers commanding at Michillimakinach, the Bay, Ooeciatunon, Miamis, &c.,

10 mark out the boundaries and expressly include those posts in Canada, so that there can be no dispute about it; yet as I see some altercation has passed in England and France about Monsieur de Vaudreuil's giving the boundaries, I should be glad to know of you whether he marked the map himself, or whether it was done in his presence, and what passed on that subject, that I may hereafter be able to say all that was done regarding the whole affair.
