## NEWS "LEAKS" TO DETROIT.

Foreign Paper Publishes Correspondence Between Dr. Reaume and the Dominion Government.

Toronto, April 18.—Twice within the last few weeks The Detroit Sunday News has printed information concerning what is going on in the Parliament buildings in Toronto, and this information has not been available for the Canadian papers. To discover where the leak is G. P. Graham devoted a few minutes of the time of the Legislature yesterday.

The first leak was under the date of April 1 and referred to the Clergy in interest securing the upper hand in the affairs of the Lake Superior Co. as the Son. Mr. Whitney gave the story a flat denial.

"Equal Rights For All"

Then on Sunday last the Detroit paper published that the "Fisheries" Departments of the Ontario and Dominion Governments have the makings of a disagreement on their hands. While the Province owns the fish and controls the license, the Dominion has the right to fix the length of the seasons. It appears that on the intercession of Mr. W. A. Charlton, the former Minister of Public Works, the season for fishing in that part of Lake Erie bordering upon Norfolk County was extended for twenty days after April 15, when it should have closed. When this was brought to the attention of Hon. Dr. Reaume, the present Minister, he telegraphed to the Ottawa department as follows:—"You will have to declare an extension of time for the entire Province, or I shall rescind every license. It is equal rights to all and special privileges to none for me."

Mr. Graham called the attention of the Government to the matter and drew from Hon. Dr. Reaume the statement that he hadn't read the article and consequently was unable to speak on the subject.

The Premier suggested that the Commissioner institute an investigation as to the source of the information, and the incident closed.

**Electric Power for Railways.**

Premier Whitney did not give a story that the Temiskaming Railway would be operated by electricity an unqualified denial when it was referred to him yesterday. "Greater things have happened," he observed, "it is understood that the Government has asked its engineers for a report on the question. There are extensive water powers available along the route of the railway and these could be utilized to furnish motive power for the Government railway."

In reply to Mr. Torrance, the Minister of Education said the following school geography was authorized on December 23, 1904, with the understanding that any changes deemed necessary in the work by the Minister of Education would be made by the publisher. An agreement was approved on January 4, 1905, regarding the authorization of the book providing that the publishers' rights be from the first of August, 1905. The book was declared legal before the adoption of the regulation of 1904.

**Order For Correspondence.**

Mr. Munro secured an order for a return of correspondence between the Government and any person with respect to the division of land. The order was issued by the Minister of the Interior, and the position of bailiff of the first division court of Grey County.

Fort William asks for the validation of the bylaw providing for a \$300,000 bonus to the Grand Trunk Pacific, and declares 1,400 acres of the Indian Mission Reserve to be granted to the railway, a part of Ward 4 of the town.

Elgin County asks for the confirmation of a bylaw to purchase the London and Port Stanley toll road.

A. P. Westervelt, secretary of the Live Stock Association, has been appointed director of the live stock branch of the Department of Agriculture.

**Two Government Bills.**

Hon. Mr. Montith has given notice of two Government bills. He proposes to amend the agricultural and arts act by providing for the holding of township fairs in central localities. Another bill will amend the act to provide for the incorporation of co-operative storage associations by extending the time for the operations of the act which expires this year.

## WHITNEY EULOGIZES BORDEN.

Conservatives To Be Congratulated Upon Having Such a Leader.

Toronto, April 18.—Premier Whitney was in a prophetic mood last night when he uttered these words at a supper of the Borden Conservative Club:

"I have a high respect for the distinguished gentleman who is the leader of one of the great parties in this country. Many months have not elapsed since, in a strong argument I presented to him why he should accept the leadership. I suggested to him that as events were shaping no man could tell when he would be called upon to become the leader of the people. I believe that time is almost in view when he may be called upon to assume new duties and when Mr. Borden will be at the head of affairs in this country."

Continuing, he said Conservatives had reason to congratulate themselves upon the possession of such a man as R. L. Borden as a leader of the people, and they could rest assured that nothing unclean or impure should have the confidence or support of R. L. Borden.

**Man of Superb Courage.**

Major Clark, M. P. P., was the only other speaker. One of the bright things he said was:

"If Mr. Whitney had been a weaker man he would have attained power sooner, but he would have been handicapped by promises which he never intended to keep. Mr. Whitney was a man of superb courage. He would rather be right than popular."
