Stephens & Co., he made some comments strongly supporting the claims made in my letters, and told me of his experience while in the employ of the P. & M. He stated that in many cases they were unable to get young men and were compelled to employ young ladies. Although the services of young ladies are more acceptable in many positions than young men, yet in the case of railway companies and a number of other lines they prefer young men because they can be advanced to higher positions, while in the case of young ladies, they perhaps follow it up for a few years, and just about the time they begin to be very use. up for a few years, and just about the time they begin to be very use-ful, they get married, and the result is that another one has to be trained. Business concerns dislike this train-ing question, and prefer to hold those ing question, and prefer to hold those who have the experience and are familiar with the work. Mr. Crombie tells me that the present salary of Mr. Calloway is \$100,000. If this be correct, and I believe it is, he is earning twice as much as the President of the United States, yet such positions are within the reach of any canable ambitious years.
