The cheapest price for which boarding can now be obtained, is three dollars per week. That the fix persons above alluded to, have no property of refources whatever, and are wholly and folely depending for their support in prison, on the five shillings per week which the law obliges the plaintiffs, by the order of the Court, to pay them, so long as they are kept. in confinement at their fuits. That although the fum of five shillings per week, might have been sufficient in the year 178, twenty-five years. ago. for the support of a person in confinement, yet, they beg leave most respectfully and most humbly to represent, that it is wholly and totally inadequate for the purpose at this time. That, in addition to this they are under the necessity of employing some person to purchase, in the market, the trifling necessaries which the sum of five shillings will procure, who receives a per centage, on the little pittance, for his trouble. That it is true, that the sum of five shillings per week, may, for a time, barely keep foul and body together; but their healths are gradually undermining, for the want of sufficient nourishment, and their constitutions. must, in the end, be broken up and destroyed. That some of them have not even a bed of straw to lie on, or a blanker to cover them. That some of them have scarcely sufficient clothing to cover them, much less to guard against the inclemency of the leason.—They therefore most humbly pray, and, when they reflect, that mankind are folemnly commanded, by the Deity, to use their utmost exertions for the preservation of the lives which he has given them,—they consider it a duty enjoined on them by their Creator, to most earnestly pray, that a creditor may not be permitted, in this way, to take the life of a debtor in prison; but that, if he will thus wantenly throw away the money out of his own pocket, to keep a poor debtor in confinement, who has no property or resources whatever, that he may be obliged, by law, to pay a fum for his support, equal at least in value, to what the sum of five shillings was, in the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty-five. of the Incitential Dr. H.
