has indemnified fuch individuals, as have suffered in their property by its being applied to public use:

The Petitioner therefore humbly prays that this petition may be referred to the Committee, to which the faid Bill is referred, and that he may be permitted to flate his claim to the right of ferriage over the faid river, and to have recourfe to its justice and equity for fuch indemnity as to its wifdom and liberality fhall feem meet and adequate to his lofs.

Quebec, 241b March, 1800.

On motion of Mr. Young, feconded by Mr. Cuthbert,

ORDERED, that the faid Petition be referred to the Committee, to whom the Bill " for erecting a Bridge over the River Jacques Cartier" is committed.

Mr. Lees from the Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of fundry Inhabitants of the Town of *Three Rivers*, reported, that the Committee had examined the matter thereof, and had directed him to report the fame to the Houfe: and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered the fame in at the Table, where it was again read throughout by the Clerk.

The faid report is as follows :

The Chairman informed the Committee, that in virtue of two different Grants, one from *Charles Huault de Montmagny*, then Governor and Lieutenant General of this Province, bearing date the 15th day of August 1648, the other from the Reverend Fathers the Jesuits, bearing date the 9th day of June 1650, the Inhabitants of the Town of *Three Rivers*, are in possession of a Common containing about 468 arpents of land, and the Chairman laid before the Committee, authenticated copies of these Grants which he afterwards withdrew.

The Chairman further informed the Committee, that in confequence of Grants made to different perfons, prior to the conquest of this Province, by His Majesty's arms, by a majority of the Inhabitants of the faid Town of *Three Rivers*, in confideration of certain yearly rents specified
